Fish Inquiry Slated

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—(P)—The senate commerce committee Thursday approved a bill directing the fish and wildlife service to investigate the fish resources of the United States. The service would be required to report to congress by Jan. 1, 1945. The committee also approved a bill to establish a new fishing code for Alaska.

The measure would extend the jurisdiction of the United States to all waters off Alaska in which the United States has jurisdiction or to which it is extended by congressional action, treaty or international agreement.

The measure places all fishing in the territorial waters under the fish and wildlife service and provides for licensing the fishermen and gear. The bill was introduced by Sen. Walgren (D-Wash.). Present holders of fishing rights would receive first preference.

Egg Production On Coast Soars

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—(P)—Pacific coast egg production continues to break all records on the books. Surprise at the hens' performance grew out of official reports that the hen population was only a little larger than a year ago, while production of eggs was one-fifth larger.

Last week's egg deliveries at Pacific coast packing plants passed the 100,000-case mark for the first time.

Production has more than doubled in four months. The seasonal increase doubled its pace of a year ago.

Declines in egg prices have made some producers talk of cutting flocks. But feed men point out increased production makes for lower costs and permits substantial price declines without loss. As an example, W. G. Alford, Globe mills feed department supervisor, computed at present average feed prices the feed cost per dozen eggs is about 18 1/2 cents a dozen, at 50 per cent production, as against 31 cents a dozen at 30 per cent production.

Any serious cutting down of flocks would affect the egg supply proportionately, and would be a public concern. It would be a producers' concern in months ahead when prices rise. And it would concern the feed suppliers, who have been straining to get feeds for enormous flocks. They might suddenly find they had surplus feed stocks on hand with a "distress" market.

Coast egg deliveries so far this year total more than 588,000 cases, or 22 per cent more than the 483,000 cases of a year ago. There could be a considerable drop, and the year's goals still be met. Official goals are about the same as last year.

Tough Job Seen For Next President

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—(P)—Rep. Everett M. Dirksen, (R., Ill.) candidate for the republican nomination for president, said today that the man elected president in 1944 "faces the toughest job any man in this nation ever undertook."

Addressing the Commonwealth club, Dirksen reviewed problems which will face the nation after the war and strongly criticized the present administration for "conflicting programs, multitudinous reports and burdensome regulations."

He said he believed the country needed a political philosophy which would assure "maintenance of individual liberty and individual responsibility."

Dirksen will speak at Seattle, Wash., Feb. 21.

War Food Flag Awarded

The blue and green flag of the war food administration achievement "A" award will soon be flying over Del Monte plant No. 120 of the California Packing corporation in Salem, according to official notification just received by Percy Blundell, superintendent.

This award, first in this area, is made by WFA in cooperation with the war and navy departments for outstanding production in seasonal food processing.

Like the army-navy "E" and the maritime "M" the achievement "A" award is described as the highest honor the government can bestow on those responsible for exceptional records in war food production.

Along with the coveted "A" flag, the award carries with it symbolic lapel pins for all of the people who worked to make this award possible.

"This recognition of the efforts made by the men and women who worked so industriously and faithfully in the fields during the past season was not only well earned but will be very deeply appreciated and a constant reminder to all of us that there is a need to work even harder to uphold and if possible surpass this war production, until the final goal of victory has been won," said Blundell.

"The company wishes to express its appreciation to the growers in the Eugene and Junction City area for their achievements in producing, harvesting, and delivering the crops to the plant for processing. The production record of the growers helped the company to meet the high requirements brought about by the demands of war."

Business Keeps Up Rise In Newsprint Output Approved

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 19.—(P)—The war production board has authorized a 10 to 25 per cent increase in the present output of paper pulp and newsprint as the result of a new whole-log hydraulic "barking" process which eliminates wood wastage in the industry.

The Pacific Pulp and Paper Industry magazine reported receipt of a telegram from the WPB authorizing the change following successful demonstration of the new machine at two Pacific northwest mills.

The Weyerhaeuser mill in Everett, Wash., and the Crown Zellerbach mill in Port Townsend, Wash., recently installed the gigantic Tacoma narrow barks.

Editors of the industrial magazine predicted that the larger lumber mills also would install the new "barkers" for the purpose of saving wood.

Eisenhower Awarded Russian Order

LONDON, Feb. 19.—(P)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has been awarded the Order of Suvorov, first class, one of Soviet Russia's highest military decorations, the Moscow radio announced last night.

The Soviets also cited five other American officers for awards. They were Lt. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz, commander of U. S. strategic air forces in the western invasion.

Election Defeats Churchill Man

LONDON, Feb. 19.—(P)—Prime Minister Churchill's conservative candidate in a parliamentary election from west Derbyshire, the Marquis of Hartington, was defeated 18,338 to 11,775 yesterday by an independent, C. F. White, son of a cobbler.

The election had been contested fiercely and attracted the attention of the whole country as a test of the government policy in endorsing candidates.

The campaign developed a Hollywood aspect when a blonde Russian woman took the stump for the cobbler's son, and the marquis contended that he could milk a cow. White's father during the campaign had taunted the marquis, a member of the Cavendish family, with this poser: "Can you milk a cow?"

The Cavendish family had represented the constituency since 1885 except for the five years between 1918 and 1923. In the last election in West Derbyshire in 1938, the conservative candidate had been returned with a 5524 majority.
