Waldport Finances In Good Condition
WALDPOR — H. L. Kelly, recorder, has published a financial statement for the city of Waldport for the year 1943. A cash balance remained on hand Dec. 31 of \$2,240.52. An interesting item is that no fines were collected for drunkenness or disorderly conduct during the entire year. Building permits brought in only \$32.50 but there are many buildings planned for after the war when this item will take a jump. Collections of water rents average nearly \$500 per month. Owing to a heavy water pressure and the distribution system Waldport enjoys a basic insurance rate of only 50c per \$100.
