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Hundreds Trapped In Finland Raid

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 22.—(AP)—A Helsinki dispatch said today that "several hundred" persons were trapped in the biggest public shelter in Oulu (Uleaburg) when Russian bombers attacked that Finnish port on the gulf of Bothnia last night.

The dispatch to the newspaper NYA Dagligt Allehanda said a bomb hit a hotel restaurant in the center of the town, sealing off the shelter and causing undetermined casualties.

Rescuers worked all night, but so far had been unable to open the shelter, it said.

Other reports said the raid started fires visible in Haparanda, Sweden, 70 miles distant.

Air raid alarms also were sounded at Haparanda.

"The glow visible from Oulu was at first a bright red without violent flashing," said a dispatch telephoned from Kem, Finland, 58 miles north of the burning city, to the Svenska Morgnbladet.

"The whole sky is shining with a steady, reddish blaze and it is believed that the whole town is burning. No explosions were audible in Kemi due to the distance."

Oulu is the biggest Finnish port on the northern part of the gulf and is an important railway center with three railway bridges spanning the Oulunjoki river.

School Lunches Soar

PORTLAND.—(AP)—Hot lunches or midday milk were served nearly 39,000 Oregon children in 355 schools participating in the WFA community school lunch program, it was reported by C. R. Tulley, state supervisor of the WFA office of distribution.

The total was only 13,000 in October and Tulley said the boost was made despite acute food and labor problems. Eligible schools and child care centers are reimbursed for a part of their food costs, as follows: Type "A" lunch, a complete meal, maximum of 9 cents contribution; "B" meal, requiring less facilities, 6 cents; "C" meal, half-pint of milk, 2 cents.

In Multnomah county, 7500 children are participating in 37 schools.

College Fraternities Hit By ASTP Curtailment

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The war department's reluctant decision to curtail the army specialized training program in order to offset a deficiency in inductions has evoked the complaint that it would be "a serious blow" to the college fraternity system.

As a result of the curtailment order, more than 100,000 student-soldiers will be withdrawn from colleges and universities by April 1. The order was given because the army has fallen 200,000 men short of its 1943 goals.

Cecil J. Wilkinson, chairman of the national interfraternity conference's "war committee," said the curtailment means that 300 fraternity houses valued at \$7,500,000 "are likely to be tenantless—with consequent loss to the fraternity alumni associations which own them."

"The fraternities," Wilkinson said, "have been drawing new members from the ranks of the ASTP men. Now these soldier initiates will no longer be available."

Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said in announcing the curtailment that the decision was made "for reasons of imperative military necessity." He said he was convinced "of the great value that his training program has been to the army," adding that the army's training needs will be constantly reviewed and that the kind of training to be given as the war progresses "will be determined by the conditions that prevail from time to time."

The ASTP, whatever its future, has developed many methods which educators believe will be incorporated in postwar civilian education.

One of the notable things introduced by both the army and navy programs, according to Dr. Malcolm M. Willey of the University of Minnesota, is streamlining of education for specific objectives. He doubted that "college and university teachers, in their civilian courses, have given corresponding thought to the objectives they seek to achieve."

Officials Discount Ship Cracking Story

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Maritime commission officials here said that the Liberty ship, converted to a troop carrier, which reportedly cracked up in Alaskan waters had returned to Seattle with only a little water in the hold and a crack in its hull.

The ship referred to was the SS Christopher Greenup, built by the Oregon Shipbuilding Company, controlled by Henry J. Kaiser, which reportedly "split wide open while tied to an Alaskan dock."

Maritime officials discounted the story, pointing out that the ship had been able to return to Seattle, and that the crack had been welded together. They said it was the only one of 10 Liberties converted to troop carriers "that has had any trouble."

Fewer than three per cent of all Liberty ships that have been delivered have shown faults, and "no serious structural faults" have been discovered, they said.

Four or five have broken in terrific storms—but this is not a worse record than other types of ships, they said.

Oil Reserves Held Adequate For Years

NEW YORK (AP)—The committee on petroleum reserves for the American Petroleum Institute reports that despite the wartime drain on oil, America's decrease in reserves last year was only 18,641,000 barrels, with total reserves amounting to 20,064,152,000 barrels on Dec. 31, 1943.

In its formal statement, the committee said "All previously determined factors pertaining to the various pools were examined and adjusted in the light of new information."

J. Edgar Pew, head of the Sun Oil company and chairman of the committee, issued a separate statement saying: "It is my opinion that the oil industry, with an adequate and fair price for its products, will be able to meet this nation's requirements for oil products from these sources of supply for many generations to come."

Although no mention of government reports was contained in the committee's findings, the general terms of the survey appeared to take issue with Petroleum Administrator Ickes' recent statements that United States oil reserves represented only a 14 years' supply.

He defied an ouster order of the city school superintendent on ground he was protected by teachers' tenure.

Legion Plan Pushed

GOLD BEACH, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The American Legion's omnibus bill for rehabilitation of World War II veterans was endorsed by Legion's state executive committee Sunday.

The bill is expected to come before congress soon.

Dan M. McDade, state commander, reported membership has reached a record 13,500 approximately 1000 more than the quota set for 1944.

A plan for restricting the state because of its increased population was presented. Districts would be increased from seven to 10. Final action will be taken at the state convention slated for Aug. 10-12 here.
