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Rotary Clubs 39
Years Old Wednesday

The Eugene Rotary club this
week observes the 39th anniver-
sary of founding of Rotary In-
ternational. First Rotary club in
the world was organized in Chi-
cago, Feb. 23, 1905, by Paul P.
Harris, a lawyer, who suggested
the idea to a group of friends.

Since then the organization has
grown steadily with the records
today showing 5200 Rotary clubs
with membership of 222,000 men.
Clubs are organized in Algeria,
Australia, China, Chile, Fiji is-
lands, French West Africa, Swe-
den, Switzerland, and more than
50 countries altogether.

General objectives of Rotary
clubs are the same in all coun-
tries—development of fellowship
and understanding among the
business and professional men in
the community, the promotion of
community-betterment endeavors
and high ethical standards in busi-
ness and professional practices,
and the advancement of interna-
tional understanding, good will,
and peace.

Activities Varied
In addition to many regular
service activities, Rotary clubs
are cooperating with their gov-
ernments in many war effort pro-
grams—in rationing, salvaging,
fund-raising campaigns, and in
all phases of civilian defense. Re-
cently, for example, the U. S. war
production board presented a ci-
tation to Rotary International in
recognition of the salvage activi-
ties of Rotary clubs in the United
States.

Now, Rotary clubs are looking
ahead to the post-war period.
Rotary International has a special
international committee to study
post-war problems.

The Eugene Rotary club was
organized Jan. 2, 1923, Robert A.
Booth being the charter president.
Dr. R. T. Burnett is president of
the club this year.

Like Rotary clubs elsewhere,
the Eugene group has stressed all
the regular Rotary activities, in
addition to special work for boys
and girls groups, welfare pro-
grams, and numerous activities in
conjunction with the civilian de-
fense and war effort.

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
