Lane Rural Areas Bought Bonds Freely

Outstanding cooperation in buying war bonds during the fourth war loan drive in rural areas is indicated by final reports now being compiled, according to Elmo B. Chase, chairman of the farmers and granges division in the campaign.

In numerous districts quotas reached higher totals than in the third war loan, indicating a better coverage by solicitors. Special credit for this record must go to grand committees in nearly 30 rural areas who organized and conducted the solicitation, says Chase.

Some 250 people worked throughout the county. Among the many notable records are those of two women who qualify for the treasury award for selling more than \$5,000 in bonds, Mrs. A. E. Teeters, Rt. 1, Springfield, working for the Mohawk-McKenzie grange, and Mrs. Cora Emerson, Santa Clara grange.

Several other women whose records have not been reported also are expected to qualify. Chase asks that all such records be turned in to him so that proper credit may be given.

All grange workers who have not submitted completed reports are asked to give them by Saturday to Ralph P. Laird, Pomona master, during the grange session. Chase extends particular thanks to these members of the county committee: O. S. Fletcher, Lennie Halderson, Miss Nellie Lyle, Fred Knox, Ralph P. HOME ON FURLOUGH

SPRINGFIELD — Miss Hattie Mitchell, who arrived Saturday on furlough from the First Christian church mission in Belgian Congo, Africa, was one of 10 people granted passage on a freighter, which must be nameless.

Due to the war, it was necessary for Miss Mitchell to take an unusually long journey through Africa, which involved taking river boats down the Congo river, trains eastward across the lower half of Africa, and finally reaching the port of Durban, which is very near the tip of Africa.

Before reaching Durban, Miss Mitchell and six other missionaries were able to see Victoria Falls in Southern Rhodesia, these falls being even larger than Niagara.

The freighter, carrying three other passengers besides the seven missionaries, arrived in Los Angeles last week after sailing around the Cape of Good Hope of Africa, and taking the route through the Panama Canal, where observations had been made from the ship itself as it took only one day to go through the locks. The whole trip, from the mission at Mondombe, Belgian Congo, to Los Angeles, took about five months.

Confidence was expressed by Miss Mitchell in the continued work of the missions, and she said that even the natives have quite successfully developed their war effort, which is the picking and coagulating of native rubber.
