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Loss Of Senator McNary Mourned By Oregonians

SALEM, Feb. 26.—(P)—Flags were flying at half mast at the state capitol today while Oregonians at home and throughout the nation honored the memory of one of the state's greatest leaders, Senator Charles L. McNary, whose death at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, was announced late Friday afternoon.

Governor Earl Snell paid tribute with the statement: "The state and the nation have suffered a great loss in the passing of Senator Charles L. McNary."

"His name has been closely associated with the growth and development of our state, as a veteran member of the United States senate and republican leader of

this great legislative body. His influence has been reflected in much legislation of national scope as well as of international significance.

"Charles McNary was a man of unusual ability and capacity, keen perception and marvelous judgment. He was a man of unquestioned loyalty and integrity. His outstanding ability, his great human understanding and his magnetic personality gave to him the honor of being the most popular man in the United States senate."

"This is a sad day indeed for the people of his native state. Our hearts are heavy. Oregon has suffered an irreparable loss."

Sen. Rufus C. Holman (R-Ore.)

"His passing is a great loss to the state of Oregon and the nation."

Wayne Morse, former public member of the war labor board and candidate for Holman's seat—"Oregon isn't the nation has lost a great statesman and leader. Senator Charles McNary epitomized in the republican party a balanced liberalism."

Rep. James W. Mott, (R-Ore.)—"He had the high regard of the people and was loved by all of them. His death is a tragedy to the state and nation."

"Senator McNary was very unsparing in his counsel and guidance to me as a new member of congress and I am deeply saddened by his untimely end."

Rep. Harris Ellsworth (R-Ore.)—"I feel his death would have been a serious blow at any time, but right now when leadership of his caliber is so sorely needed his death is a calamity to the nation."

Rep. Homer D. Angell (R-Ore.)—"Not only Oregon, but the nation suffers loss in his passing."

Maj. Gen. Charles H. Martin, ex-governor and ex-congressman—"I consider his loss irreparable."

In Washington, members of both parties joined other prominent leaders in hailing him as a statesman bigger than a party—"A Great American."

Vice-President Henry A. Wallace said, "Charles McNary was one of the finest men I have ever known. He joined with my father in fighting for agricultural justice against the leaders of his own party."

The man who would have been McNary's chief antagonist on the senate floor, Democratic Leader Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, said he was "profoundly shocked and grieved at the news of Charles McNary's death."

Many house and senate leaders called him irreplaceable, and senate republicans are not expected to elect a new leader to replace McNary for several months who among the republicans take the place of the senator is a question which is difficult to answer.

Only last Thursday McNary probably would have returned to his seat as leader and chairman of the senate. At the same time, McNary's vice-chairman and successor, Vandenberg, (R-Mich.) Robert A. Taft (R-Ore.) been most prominently named as possible successor.

All republicans believe that it will be difficult to find a man as impartial in his mind and as a well-thought straightforwards as McNary. When the senate meets Tuesday, it will adjourn ately in his honor.
