Wintemute, Nichols Dominate All-Stars

Members of the University of Oregon basketball squad, second-place quintet in the northern division and potential winners of the mythical "civillian" league, attended a season-closing banquet at the Eugene hotel Sunday.

Anson B. Cornell, Oregon athletic manager, was toastmaster, and the gathering included 14 squad members, Coach Howard Hobson, Pop Merrill, equipment manager; Mike Steddom, McArthur court superintendent; Warren Teter, photographer Winsor Calkins, timer; Bill Baker, announcer; Nick Wodell, team manager; and Dick Strite, publicity director. Trainer P. O. Sigereth and Orlando Hollis, university president, were unable to attend.

Hobson praised the work of his players, and paid particular tribute to Wally Borrevik, three-year letterman center who completed his eligibility this season. Bob Hamilton, honorary captain and potential scoring champion of the division, responded in behalf of the squad.

College Teams Set For Finale

Collegiate basketball makes its final bow in the Pacific northwest this week with two unanswered questions—will the University of Washington Huskies go through the 16-game season undefeated, and who will be in the northern division cellar—Idaho or Washington State?

Oregon State marked finis to its conference season Saturday night with a 33-44 victory over Washington State and moved into third place by the grace of a few percentage points.

Washington, riding the crest of a two-season 18-game unbeaten streak in conference competition, moves into the Inland Empire for split series against Idaho and the Cougars, playing the Vandals on Tuesday and Friday, and Washington State on Wednesday and Saturday.

The Cougars and Vandals now are deadlocked for the league cellar, each with four wins and 10 losses.

Allen Anderson, Beaver guard, connected for 18 points Saturday night, one less than he needed to tie Oregon's Wally Borrevik for second place in the northern division scoring parade. Anderson scored 166 points during the season. Bob Hamilton of Oregon leads with 172.

Earl Sheely Named Pilot Of Sacramento Ball Club

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 23.—(U.P.)—Earl Sheely is the manager of the new home-owned Sacramento Pacific coast league baseball club and his duties will start at once, making final plans for spring training.

Sheely, former major league first-baseman who has been a scout for the Boston Red Sox in recent years, came to terms yesterday after receiving a release from Eddie Collins, general manager of the Boston team.

Collins telegraphed: "I feel the new owners are to be congratulated for their wise selection. They could not have chosen a more capable or finer man for such a job. Boston regrets exceedingly to lose Earl, but I personally am delighted that he has this opportunity."

Under terms of the three-year contract, Sheely will receive \$8000 in money and \$2000 in stock the first year, \$9000 in money and \$1000 in stock the second year, with full \$10,000 to be paid him in money in his third year.

In addition to managing the club on the field, Sheely has been given baseball operations power by the owners. He will be free to sign and release players or make deals.

The new manager is a graduate of Gonzaga University. After spending his first few years in organized baseball with Spokane and Salt Lake City, he was signed by the Chicago White Sox in 1920, where he remained for seven seasons. He played for Sacramento in 1928.

His nine-year batting average in the major leagues, a year each having been spent with Pittsburgh and the Boston Braves, was .301. Joseph O'Neill, service station operator and sportsman, is president of the Sacramento club, and Yubi Separovich, is business manager.

'B' Tourney Set For Openers

All of Lane county awaits the opening of the 20th annual "B" high school basketball tournament, to be staged at McArthur court Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Out of the eight-team playoff will come two entries for the district B-2 tourney to be held the following week at Junction City against teams from Linn, Lincoln and Benton counties—and that event will produce a state tournament title contender.

An added attraction to the three-day event at the Igloo will be a consolation playoff between four teams that failed to qualify for the championship playoff.

Pleasant Hill is the defending champion and holds the favored position this season along with three other seeded quintets—Mohawk, Sislaw of Florence, and St. Mary's Catholic of Eugene. Other title contenders are Oakridge, Co-burg, Crow and Mapleton.

The consolation event will include Lowell, Creswell, McKenzie and Elmira.

Lane county basketball has produced many outstanding quintets, but has never been able to equal the performance of neighboring Bellfountain, that won the state tourney title at Salem in 1937 by defeating Lincoln of Portland 35-31. Mohawk, Lowell, Thurston and Oakridge have sent teams to state playoffs. Thurston gained prominence in 1938 when piloted by the first and only woman coach in tourney history—Genevieve Beaman. But two Oakridge teams made names for themselves. In 1935 an Oakridge team led by Laddie Gale, late an all-American at Oregon, won the "B" title, and in 1939 the Warriors took third place in the state event besides winning the "B" title, losing only to Salem's state champs.

This year's tournament may produce another title contender. The schedule calls for games to start at 4:30 daily, running through the evening without intermission.
