Tire Tour Party to Visit Eugene Wednesday
A demonstration touring party sponsored by the AAA to ascertain by practical methods the necessary facts regarding synthetic tire and recap wear and other factors of motor car conservation, will arrive in Eugene about 3 p. m. Wednesday for a public demonstration on Eugene streets.
Members of the touring party will be greeted at the Eugene hotel by Jerry Merritt, representative of the Oregon state Motor association, affiliate of the AAA which is sponsoring the demonstration in order to impress American motorists with the importance of war time motor car preservation. Harold Parmenter, Pontiac dealer, and Jim Brannen, tire dealer, will also greet the party.
The demonstration tour of 20,000 miles is endorsed by the office of defense transportation, war production board and other war agencies in the interest of war time conservation.
