Italy, of course, already is recognized as a co-belligerent by the allies. Whatever may be the decision regarding an alliance, there can be no doubt that Italy must pay dearly for her partnership with Hitler. Unless there is an amazing change of heart in the allied camp, she will never get back the bulk of her empire. She will be reduced to one of the minor European powers, stripped of any striking-power with which to practice further aggression.

by Robert W. Prescott, asked the mayor to appoint a committee to study rent control. Discussion indicated "above ceiling" rents may exist here. The committee will (1) "get the facts," (2) receive complaints, (3) hold hearings, and (4) make recommendations.

Prescott said that local and "voluntary" control would be necessary if federal government interference on the problem is to be prevented. Among those asking rent control are two railroad men, Chris Jensen, representing Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and J. E. Davis, representing Brotherhood of Local Firemen and Enginemen.

The high school "campus" project, proposed for the area south of Nineteenth East and east of the civic stadium, will be "ruined" if High street is cut through its center as suggested by the planning commission. Members of the school board testified. Among this group were Austin Dodds, chairman, and Winsor Calkins. Others objecting to the move were Howard Hobson, Superintendent J. F. Cramer of Eugene schools, Principal Harry B. Johnson of Eugene high, Councilman Ira O. Stewart, Lloyd Payne, Mrs. W. S. Love, Stanley R. Stevenson, Graham Smith, and Dean J. R. Jewell of the University school of education.

Need Stressed
Prescott, president of the planning council said that the future city of Eugene will suffer unless an adequate north-and-south artery in the High or Mill street areas is found, but opined that an adequate solution probably could be worked out, possibly by a curve from High to Hilyard, as has been suggested. W. L. Davis, chairman of the street committee, said his group would take these points into consideration before making any recommendation to the council. It was generally agreed by those present that bisecting the school grounds by a 100-foot highway would not improve them.

In order to give more time for discussion, the parks committee's proposed ordinance for more severe regulation in cutting of trees (clearance of 15 feet over streets) was held over until the March 13 meeting. Second reading of the measure was given by title. Several councilmen reported they had received complaints from property owners.

Budget Committee

In naming eight citizens to the budget committee for 1944-45, Mayor Elisha Large pointed out that post-war projects must be given new consideration. He said that Eugene has received nationwide publicity on its planning program, and that action is needed. "We've got to do something or shut up," he said. One of the leading projects will be rebuilding of the sewer system, which might be financed by levy of five mills for the next five years. Action must be taken on this before March 18, he declared.

Amazon Problem

Permission to obtain "facts and figures" on damages caused by the Amazon, which has cost many groups money because of its inadequate drainage, was given to El-

mer F. McBe, Mrs. W. O. Geho and Ed Furnish. Their research will be pointed toward the necessity for widening the slough.

Acceptance was made of the following property offers: southeast corner Madison and Clark to E. Loose Talk Blamed For Kiska Escape

SEATTLE, Feb. 29.—(P)—Loose talk, radiating from the Alaska embarkation port of Seattle, enabled the Japanese to pull thousands of troops and great quantities of material out of Kiska last August, an army intelligence spokesman says, thereby leaving invading U. S. forces "with a hollow victory tantamount to defeat."

Maj. Albert J. Stowe, personal representative of Gen. Clayton Bissell, assistant chief of staff, army intelligence, told interviewers yesterday:

"Common was the knowledge in Seattle that we planned to attack Kiska and, prior to the invasion, unauthorized persons, both military and civilian, openly disclosed the date, Aug. 15."

"As a result the Japs got out, voluntarily. Not one remained on the island when our troops arrived at 3 o'clock in the morning. Some scattered machine-gun fire the day before, reported by our reconnaissance fliers, indicated presence of hostile troops then. Even these were gone when we got there," Maj. Stowe said.

"They knew we were coming, and when," he asserted. "So accurately and so far in advance were the Japs tipped off that had they chosen to implement their forces they might have annihilated us."

War In Brief

of new devices and equipment in the post-war. The chamber of commerce of that community has been notified that the plant will be built in that area if:

1.—A vast acreage for plant and adjacent facilities can be acquired and cleared for plant and for the proper permanent housing of workers.

2.—All necessary facilities such as roads, rail connections, sewers, power lines, schools are laid out so as to give permanent relief from present unhealthy congestion.

In this community the chamber is raising a cash sum in excess of \$300,000 to lay the groundwork for this project (their city is broke as usual). They are also trying to set up Area Planning and coordinated tax controls.

Offer Passed Up
It is interesting to note that this concern is NOT putting this huge new plant into any of the cities where it already has large plants hemmed in by bad traffic management and bad living conditions. Also it is passing up an offer of three government-built war plants because:

1.—They were not well built for the purpose.

2.—They were not well located for permanent operation.

3.—Plants which are not well built and not in a well planned community are not considered a bargain by this concern.

Of course, not all business people are so progressive. There were two gentlemen in Cleveland, both connected with very large concerns, who pooh-poohed the whole idea of any effort to look ahead. Said they:

"All you fellows are crazy with the heat. This country never was so united or so prosperous. Everybody has a job and everybody has money. In the post-war we will have markets such as nobody ever dreamed of. It will be a period of unparalleled prosperity. Race or religious prejudice? You are crazy. Class troubles? You are crazy. Oh sure, they had a little trouble in Detroit. What if?"

These gents have speculated heavily in real estate in confident expectation of the post-war boom. They have only the most vague notion of the effect of public debt and tax structures on property values.
