In cutting the funds for community facilities, the committee put a limitation of four per cent on funds that may be used for administrative purposes, and emphasized that new facilities should be confined "to the type of commercial establishment the absence or inaccessibility of which is the cause of absenteeism."

In explanation of the \$17,500,000 cut in war housing funds, the committee said the need for such housing was declining.

Continuing correspondence has ensued, from the chief of staff of the headquarters ninth service command, at Fort Douglas, Utah; headquarters Portland army air base, Portland, Ore., and finally from headquarters of Corvallis army air field, Lieut. Charles W. Zeiser, Jr., commanding officer, who will make the presentation.

Asked to choose a time and place, either here or at the Corvallis field, Mrs. Gredvig has asked that the presentation be made at her home, with Lieutenant Gredvig's parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Gredvig, 2010 Monroe, present. A choice of dates was offered, for convenience of the officer, Lieutenant Gredvig was reported as missing in action after the raid on Frankfurt, Oct. 4, 1943, in which he participated as pilot of a Flying Fortress in the command of Col. Kermit Stevens, also formerly of Eugene. He was reported as a prisoner of war in Germany in November.

He enlisted in the army air forces in the spring of 1942, receiving his commission in April, 1943, and going overseas in May of last year.

to slow us down for the time being, we feel sure they will be found very wise over the years."

Meetings have already been held with trustees of the old Odd Fellows cemetery with view to working out a specific special project in that direction, but building up of the general fund through the interests of hundreds of small givers is still regarded as the main objective.

Treasurer's report by Charles Gilliland shows \$549.81 balance in Century Fund after paying filing fees and initial costs. Most of this money has been received in small individual contributions since Dec. 26 when Century Fund was announced.

Trustees said they considered this response remarkable in view of the fact that there are "no drives or solicitations" and till now there has been little publicity on the movement.

President McCready acknowledged the request of the late Dean Eric Allen that instead of sending flowers to his funeral the equivalent should be given to Century Fund or Red Cross.

"Dean Allen," said McCready, "was the very first person to become a contributor to this endowment. I think everybody will understand the spirit of his request and his desire to have his tributes turned to the benefit of the living. We will see to it that all gifts in memory of Dean Allen are acknowledged properly and promptly."

Trustees heard a report of W. M. Tugman, recently returned from the East that many large eastman foundations are much interested in the Century Fund plan, especially its democratic setup which puts the smallest giver on a par with the largest in annual reports.

Leighton Carter, director of the big Cleveland Foundation has asked for copies of the Century Fund setup because Cleveland Foundation is establishing a similar democratic plan to bring all citizens instead of just a few into the community movement.
