Lenten Thought

Saturday, March 11
RIGHTLY ARMED: "Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God." Ephesians 6:13. Read Ephesians 6:13-18.

The material furnishings of soldiers has changed beyond belief since Paul saw Roman legions on the march, their armor shining in the sunlight.

The furnishings for the warfare of the spirit are still the same: Truth and righteousness and faith and the "preparation for peace" (what a haunting phrase). Prayer and salvation are still the defense and power of overcoming for the soul and unless we are thus inwardly armed all other armament is futile. Paul must have loved writing this ringing passage. He was himself a warrior and he knew that life is warfare.

But he sought, long before William James, "the moral equivalent of war." He knew that only good-will can vanquish ill-will; that evil can only be overcome by good; that the strategic engagement is not against flesh and blood; that the gospel of Jesus Christ is "the preparation for peace"; that those who take the field under the standard of the Cross are, under God, the ultimate victors. "Who follow in His train?"

PRAYER: O God the strength of all that put their trust in thee, grant that we may be more than conquerors over all that makes war upon our souls, and being furnished rightly in love and goodness, may by our steadfastness hasten the triumph of all those things that make for peace both of body and soul. Through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen.

Former Register, Guard Editor Dies

McMINNVILLE, March 11.—(P)—Paul R. Kelly, 71, former editor of the Oregonian, died here today of complications following an influenza attack.

Kelly, who retired in 1939 after nearly 42 years in newspaper work, was stricken at his home and birthplace in nearby Lafayette and was brought to the McMinnville general hospital a few days ago.

Kelly started as a cub reporter in 1896 for the now defunct Evening Telegram in Portland, later became city editor. In 1905 he went to the Los Angeles Examiner as city editor, and joined the Oregonian in 1908 as news editor.

With his son, Eugene S. Kelly, he purchased the Eugene Guard in 1924. He announced his retirement a few years later, but inactivity pallied and he returned to Eugene to become managing editor of the Morning Register.

He rejoined the Oregonian in 1930 as an editorial writer and a year later became managing editor.

Survivors are the widow and the son, who as a civilian is handling public relations for the Portland army air base. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Cobb Asks For No Mourning; Negro Choir To Sing Hymns

PADUCAH, Ky., March 11.—(P)—Friends of Irvin S. Cobb today carried out the humorist's request that there be no "funeral flipper" in completing arrangements for memorial services.

Cobb, 67, who had been ailing for many years, died in New York yesterday after being in a coma for 34 hours. Mrs. Cobb and his nurse were at the bedside. Private services will be held there Monday, followed by cremation, and the ashes will be sent to Paducah.

Mattie Copeland, negro, former cook in the Cobb home here, was in charge of the memorial service to be conducted today in Paducah. She was asked in a letter Cobb wrote before his death to gather some of her choir friends from Burke's chapel "Swing Low Sweet Chariot" and "Deep River."

When she heard of Cobb's death, Mattie made the rounds, ordered the choir to report today and a turned home last night, weary but contented that she was carrying out "Mistuh Cobb's" request.

"Some of them jist sit right down and cried," she said. Cobb wouldn't have liked that.

The prophet of Paducah, where parks and public works have been named after him, three months ago, when illness pressed heavily, wrote his old friend, Edwin J. Paxton, Sr., local editor and publisher, and asked that the letter be opened after his death.

"In death I desire," the letter said, "that no one shall look upon my face, and once more I charge my family, as already and repeatedly I have done, that they shall put on none of the bogus habiliments of the so-called mourning. Folds of black crepe never ministered to the memory of the departed; they only make the wearer unhappy and self-conscious."

Cobb said that he wanted no frills attached to his final rites. "If anybody tries to insert one of those dismal numbers run up by the undertakers' dress-making department, I'll come back and ha'n't 'em," he said.

The humorist asked that his ashes be laid at the roots of a dogwood tree in Paducah "at the proper planting season. Should the tree live, that will be monument enough to me."

Paxton said that Cobb's wishes will be carried out.

Vatican Radio Station To Air Pope's Speech

A Vatican broadcast reported by the office of war information Friday night said that ceremonies in Vatican city, attendant to an address by Pope Pius XII will be broadcast Sunday beginning at 7:10 a.m. Pacific war time.

The pope will address refugees from southern Italy on the fifth anniversary of his coronation, beginning at 7:30 a.m. The church bells of Rome will ring for five minutes immediately preceding his appearance.
