Art Class Opens For Primary Teachers

An art class designed especially for primary teachers, and stressing basic forms of representation applicable in teaching art skills in public schools, is being offered on the university campus through the general extension division. It was announced Thursday by W. G. Beattie, acting director of the extension division. The classes, scheduled to begin this Thursday evening, will meet every Tuesday and Thursday at 7:15 p. m., 101 art building, and will be held through July 13. A \$5 entrance fee will be charged for the complete course.

The class will be taught by Hazel Fishwood, supervisor of art in the public schools of Eugene, and although it is designed to be of special interest for teachers who will be instructing basic art work in public schools, the course should

be valuable to anyone interested in art, and no requirements in art training will be necessary for admittance in the course. The number of people who may be accommodated in a course of this nature is limited, Beattie pointed out, and those wishing to enroll go to the class scheduled for Thursday evening.

Adair Engineers Bridge Willamette

CAMP ADAIR — In a race against time, men of Co. B, 270th combat engineers, 70th division, erected a 507-foot-long bridge over the Willamette river last week, in five hours and 43 minutes.

The men were called out at 1300, (1 p. m.) and given the situation and an approximate river site by Captain Kermit A. Siegrist. Then the race was on.

Men and trucks were dispatched to battalion S-4 and loading of equipment begun. Then materials were hauled six miles to the site and building started. The width of the river necessitated the use of both assault boats and 10-ton metal pontoons.

Half the bridge had to be assembled upstream and floated into place. During this time men using pontoons, barge and ches were pushing their sections across at the river site. The far shore party meanwhile had installed four shallow-water trestles and the far shore abutment. With clock-like precision the two sections were brought together and joined in midstream, anchors tossed out, lashings completed and both sections joined to abutments. The first truck rolled over the bridge at 1843 (6:43 p. m.).

Then came the fatal words: "Tear it down on your own time."

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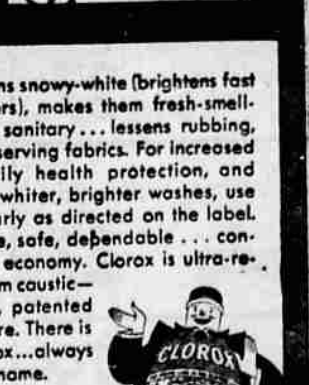
