behind Charan Kanoa in a swampy lake area where the Japanese mounted tank-supported counterattacks which were turned back, narrow Charan Kanoa airstrip bordering the beach in the initial attack but as yet it is not out of mortar range.

Thanks to the preparatory strikes against dozens of Japanese bases in the Carolines, the Japanese were unable to send aloft a single plane to interfere with the landing operations and the dusk arrival of five Japanese torpedo-planes was nullified by an anti-aircraft barrage which forced them to jettison their explosives harmlessly.

U. S. naval forces patrolled the 2 1/2 mile channel separating Saipan and Tinian islands and effectively prevent an artillery enfilade during the assault by knocking out the Tinian batteries.

Drive On Schedule We arrived off Saipan exactly on schedule and ships carrying the assault troops were in their prescribed positions within two minutes of the times specified in the plans drawn up weeks earlier.

When the sun came up the morning light illuminated a sea bobbing with landing craft. Battleships and cruisers had already begun roaring reveille with their big guns and planes swept overhead to drop nearly 100 tons of bombs on the invasion beaches.

The powerful hammering of the beachers apparently forced the Japanese to abandon any plans to defend them with automatic weapons as they did at Tarawa and the assault troops met only mortar and artillery fire as they went in.

The troops going ashore charged forward over the airstrip, bypassing the town and leaving mop-up jobs to following waves, but were forced to slow up and consolidate the gains as mortar fire was intensified.

The Americans occupied key points in the initial attack and found huge sugar mills in flames. An imitation Scotch distillery shared the same fate.

As the battle progresses into the more mountainous regions in the center and the north of the island fighting is likely to become more bitter. The large Jap garrison is well organized.

There is shaping up the greatest battle of the Pacific war—but it was expected and it highlights the progress of the war in the last six months which has carried the fight to within 1400 miles of the Japanese homeland.

At the navy's request, Red Cross motor corps volunteers will operate navy car pools at naval stations in the United States wherever needed.

Hoyt Again (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1) armored forces, seabees, amphibious engineers, and various specialist corps. During Hollandia-Tanahmerah-Aitape invasion, Wilson traveled more than 9000 miles from the time he left an Australian base until he returned.

The correspondent once had his oxygen mask shot away by a Japanese 20 mm. shell, and 10 machinegun bullets from one of the 40 attacking Zeros patterned themselves around his body.

Wanger Speaks "The challenge and the opportunity for screen and press today is to keep the people informed and that task means more than giving facts—an informed citizen wants to know the relationship between facts and what these facts mean in terms of his life, his job, his family, his country," said nourished, the wealthiest, or the Academy of Arts and Sciences, in addressing the Friday evening banquet of the publishers, his topic being "Post-war is Now."

"The hope of the American people lies not in our being the best nourished, the wealthiest, or the best clothed nation in the world. It lies in our being the best informed," he declared.

"This new world is partially our making because the most marked changes have been brought about by communications. Its problems must be faced now! They can not be put off until after the war," Wanger continued.

Employment Discussed Veterans' rehabilitation, post-war employment, housing, interracial friction, and education were discussed by the speaker as some of the most urgent home front problems and ones calling for citizen information and citizen action. The job of screen and press is to create an informed citizenship to solve these problems, and it is the duty of these two industries to give the public the information they must have to work out these problems, the visitor added.

Wanger arrived here late Friday by plane, especially to attend the meeting at the invitation of Palmer Hoyt, ONPA president. Wanger also is working in the interest of the fifth war bond drive. He will be here through Saturday.

Gilbert Farrar, noted topographical designer, predicted that post-war newspapers will feature pictures in full color daily, and said that two out of every three publishers planning to buy presses as soon as they are again available will purchase four-color machines. He said he knew of one newspaper which has already made plans to run its daily comic page in full color after the war is over.

"The public buys on the eye appeal of a newspaper, not on its intellectual merit," he said. "Four out of the six newspapers which I will design soon are changing to the tabloid size. This is the trend in newspapers; we are destined to see more and more half-size sheets in the future."
