

Trouble In Filling School Posts Seen

SALEM, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—There is serious trouble filling teaching positions in Oregon's schools this year, according to the state education department. Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction, said today.

The 1943 legislation authorizing the use of emergency teachers' certificates will be continued for another year, he said.

Mergers of small school districts, similar to those which took place last year because of the teacher shortage, are expected this year, Putnam said.

A SECRET AMERICAN AIR-BASE IN WESTERN CHINA, June 17.—(AP)—Rugged 1st Lt. Pat A. Chance, of Los Angeles, Calif., one of 28 American army engineers who supervised construction of the huge B-29 bases, is worried about his postwar future.

"When the war is over," he lamented, "I'll know what will happen. I'll ask for a civilian job and they'll hand me a form to fill out. There'll be a dotted line—'Past Experience and Size of Job Handled'—and my answer'll have to be: 'Built airbase with 65,000 coolies and little else.'"

Play Program Gets Under Way Friday

Eugene's summer recreation program was under way Saturday. Parents of elementary-school-age pupils are urged to have their children go to Lincoln, Condon, or Frances Willard schools. Supervisors who are skilled in working with children will be present at all playgrounds every weekday afternoon from 1 to 5.

Junior high age boys and girls are to go to Roosevelt or Wilson, where George Nelson of Roosevelt or Jack Thompson of Wilson will be in charge of activities. A varied program of sports—including croquet, volleyball, badminton, and softball—will be featured. Roosevelt school will be open for eastsiders and Wilson or Eugene high school for westsiders. An effort will be made to accommodate anyone, junior high school age or above, who wishes to take part in shop activities.

Supervisors at the playgrounds will be Miss Clara Beitel at Lincoln, Mrs. Edith Hayes and Miss Frances Elizabeth Baker at Frances Willard, and Miss Roberta Graves and Miss Ann Moses at Condon. Another supervisor will be selected to assist Miss Beitel at Lincoln.

Tennis courts at the fairground will be available any time, and at the University of Oregon from 1 to 4 p.m. daily. Tickets for use of the campus courts may be obtained from the supervisors, or at the office of the director, Harry Davis, in the city hall.

The men's pool at the university will be available Monday and Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 for swimming for boys. Tickets are obtainable from supervisors or director. There will be no admission except by ticket.

Saturday night dances are planned, and will be held on much the same plan as last summer's dances, alternating between Roosevelt and Wilson junior high schools.

Refrigeration Class

To help meet the increasing demand for qualified refrigerator repair men and women, Eugene vocational school will open a class on refrigeration July 5.

Since elementary electricity will be the basis for the work, the plan is to give both elementary and advanced refrigeration training; both those with and without experience will be assisted. Study will include that of small home units, medium-sized units such as those used in the country, and large commercial types.

The course will be under direction of Harold Eastlick, and will be given Mondays through Fridays from 7 to 10 p.m. Persons interested may register at Eugene vocational school, Fourth and Madison, or call 1928. There is no charge and all tools and materials are furnished.

Douglas MacArthur 191; Governor Earl Warren of California 67.

Col. Ray F. Olson Acting Head Of Oregon National Guard

SALEM, June 17.—(AP)—Col. Ray F. Olson, member of the Oregon national guard since 1916 and who was finance officer of the 41st division in the southwest Pacific, was appointed Oregon's acting adjutant general today by Governor Earl Snell.

Col. Elmer V. Wootton, state selective service director, asked Governor Snell yesterday to relieve him of his duties as acting adjutant general.

Brig. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, who went to the southwest Pacific as assistant division commander of the 41st division, and who now is commander of a large army base port in Australia, is adjutant general, and Colonel Olson will serve until General Rilea's return to Oregon.

Colonel Olson served in the first World War as a first lieutenant in the Oregon engineers, and he reenlisted in the Oregon national guard on his return to Oregon. He was promoted to captain in 1923, and in 1927 became a major.

In 1931 he was assigned to the 41st division as its adjutant and

was promoted to lieutenant colonel. He also served as intelligence officer and as property disbursing officer for the Oregon national guard.

When the guard was inducted into federal service in 1940, he became finance officer for the 41st division.

After serving a year with the division in Australia and New Guinea, he was returned for hospitalization last year to the United States. He was released from the hospital in April, 1943, and was sent to Fort Bragg, N. C., to serve as fiscal officer. He recently was given a medical discharge from the army.

He will take over his new duties July 1.

Sale of Government Eggs at Five Cents Per Case Charged

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—War food administration officials disclosed today that about 57,000 cases of government-owned eggs have been sold for livestock feed at five cents a case in the past three weeks.

WFA has bought more than 5,000,000 cases of eggs since Jan. 1 in an effort to prevent a collapse of egg prices when production hit a new record high. The eggs diverted into livestock feed cost the government about \$322,000 and were sold for about \$2,850. The program was instituted because of the difficulty in finding storage for the eggs and to prevent complete loss through spoiling.

WFA officials reported that 25,000,000 cases in danger of spoiling a week ago have been disposed of. Egg dryers and distributors were persuaded to buy more than half of the government surplus at prevailing market prices. Storage space was found for the rest.

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Why Rubber Is Scarce

One medium tank requires 810 pounds of synthetic rubber and 30.9 pounds of reclaim, and other war machines have equally heavy appetites for rubber. And that's where the immense supply of synthetic rubber pouring from factories all over the country is going, it is explained by Jim Brannen, General tire distributor in Eugene.

A 75 MM gun carriage needs 404 pounds of synthetic rubber and 10.3 pounds of reclaim; a 33 MM gun carriage must have 70 pounds of synthetic and 18½ pounds of reclaim. In every jeep there is used 70 pounds of synthetic and 41.8 pounds of reclaim. A field ambulance or three-fourths ton scout car takes 200 pounds of synthetic and 51.72 pounds of reclaim.

When the needs of the navy and merchant marine are added it is easy to see why there is no rubber surplus, Brannen commented.

Waves Get High Praise From Admiral King

High praise of the work of the waves given by Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet and chief of naval operations, in a recent report to the secretary of the navy has been

reiterated by officers-in-charge of the naval stations and activities in Oregon where waves are now on duty, according to a report just released by Chief W. E. Bell, of the Eugene U. S. navy recruiting station, which handles WAVES applications in this area.
