### B-29 Brushes Off Jap Planes

WASHINGTON — (AP) — One of the major questions about the B-29 Superfortress—could it protect itself?—was answered satisfactorily by an unanticipated encounter with a dozen Japanese planes over Burma many weeks before its first big raid on Japan. The giant bomber is believed to have shot down two of the attacking fighters before the enemy turned away. The B-29 received a few bullet holes and one gunner was wounded slightly.

Brig. Gen. H. S. Hansell, chief of the staff of the 20th air force, which uses the Superfortress, told the story to a group of writers during a visit to the Boeing aircraft plant at Wichita, Kas.

Hansell said the bomber was cruising over Burma at a lower altitude than it usually will fly when the Japanese fighters came along. He added the craft acquitted itself very well. The bomber's ability to defend itself is important because its range is well beyond that of escort fighters.

### US-Turkish Relations Show Improvement

ANKARA, June 17—(AP)—A hastening of Anglo-American Turkish commercial negotiations leading to a big reduction or complete stoppage of war-essential materials from this nation to Germany is likely to be the first result of the change in the Turkish foreign ministry, vacated by Numan Menemencioğlu, reliable sources said today.

Ultimate success of the negotiations, however, depends upon the allies' ability to convince Turkey that they can absorb Turkish products now shipped to Germany and supply replacements and spare parts to keep Turkey's German-equipped industry running, it was learned.

U. S. Ambassador Laurence A. Steinhardt visited Premier Sukru Saracoglu for an hour this afternoon. The cabinet deputized Saracoglu as foreign minister after Menemencioğlu's resignation.
