WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—The house passed and sent to the senate today a \$2,598,165,535 deficiency appropriation bill—last of the year's regular supply measures. It disposed of the measure while senate-house conferees were attempting to reach a compromise over separate legislation continuing the price control act and OPA. Most of the new funds in the bill were earmarked for OPA.

their way into Tilly-sur-Seulles, 12 miles west of Caen, and captured the northern part of the ruined town. The Germans clung stubbornly to the southern part, but were being driven out in block by block fighting at close quarters.

Fresh Troops In

Amidst the massive test of strength on the Norman beach-head, it was announced officially that fresh allied troops had poured into the battle at many points to strengthen the United States and British forward positions.

Meanwhile there was no sign of a big scale German counter-offensive from the south against the American barricade thrown across the Cherbourg peninsula during the week-end fighting.

It appeared possible that the Germans at the base of the peninsula still had not recovered from the shock of the break-through to the west coast, and the Americans were taking advantage of their confusion to broaden and strengthen the corridor, which already had proved impervious to the one heavy thrust in the area northwest of St. Sauveur.

Dirty weather cut the allied air activity in the immediate battle area to a minimum basis of a few standing fighter patrols and a handful of sorties by fighter-bombers from beachhead landing strips.

The eighth air force, however, put about 500 heavy bombers into an attack on air fields and military installations, especially luftwaffe bases south of Normandy.

Reds on Threshold Of Key Finn City

MOSCOW, June 19.—(AP)—Soviet field dispatches declared today that the red army had smashed forward to the threshold of Viipuri, key city in southern Finland, after breaking the Mannerheim line and capturing Koivisto fortress at the mouth of Viipuri bay.

Farther inland on the Karelian isthmus the Russians were reported to have driven two and a half miles past the Mannerheim line in the Murila sector.

While the red army's left flank had made the most progress along the Gulf of Finland, dispatches said that the right wing on the opposite side of the isthmus now was advancing along Lake Ladoga, capturing numerous points.

The red army reached the Mannerheim line Saturday, three days after breaking the Raivola-Yokeli line, and breached the old Mannerheim forts yesterday in a single swift rush.

A Pravda dispatch said soviet army men were "electrified" by their first view of the Mannerheim pillboxes which they had blown up in the Soviet-Finnish war of 1939-1940.

The Russians attacked at dawn yesterday, smashing enemy pillboxes and trenches with artillery fire. After the barrage only gran-

ite tank barriers remained intact. Red army infantry chased the survivors out of the fortifications, took the villages of Murila and Iliakiriola and pushed two more miles beyond the line until checked by fire from Koivisto fort.

Warships of the red Baltic fleet promptly shelled Koivisto island and the mainland fort. The Russians were reported advancing up Viipuri bay, with infantry moving in trucks and artillery towed by tractors pressing closely on the heels of the Finns.
