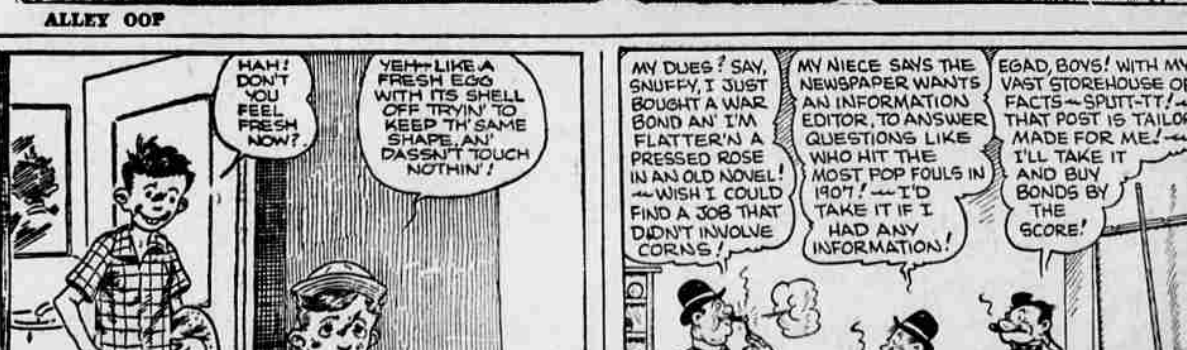
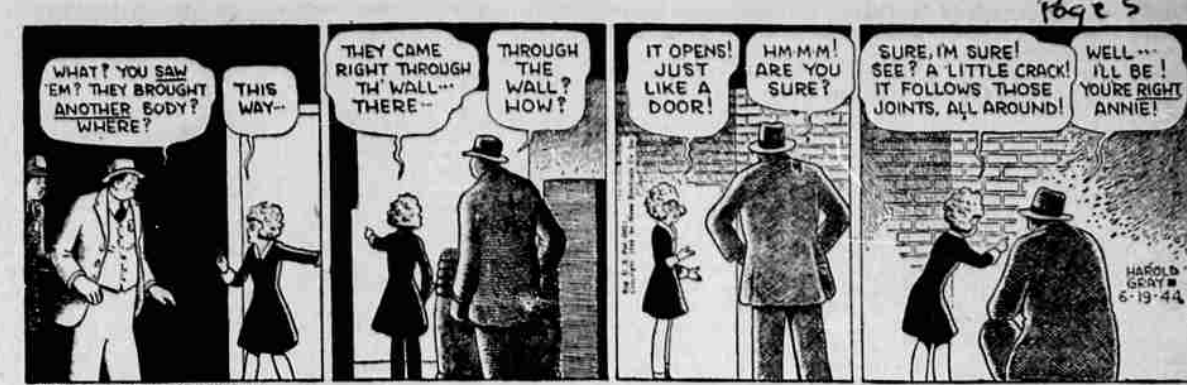
Mrs. Leroy Morrison and Mrs. George Blankenship of Port Townsend, Wash., recently visited at the J. A. Blankenship home.
