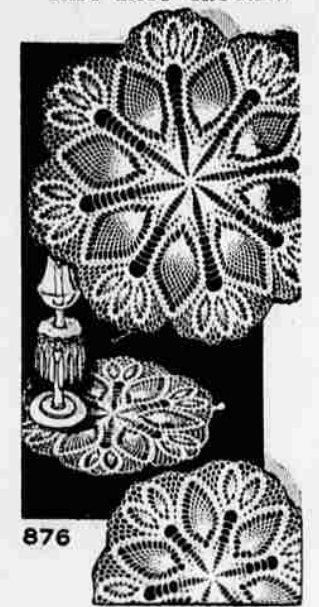

Cpl. Frances Calef from Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, is spending a two weeks furlough, visiting her mother, Mrs. Hazel Calef.

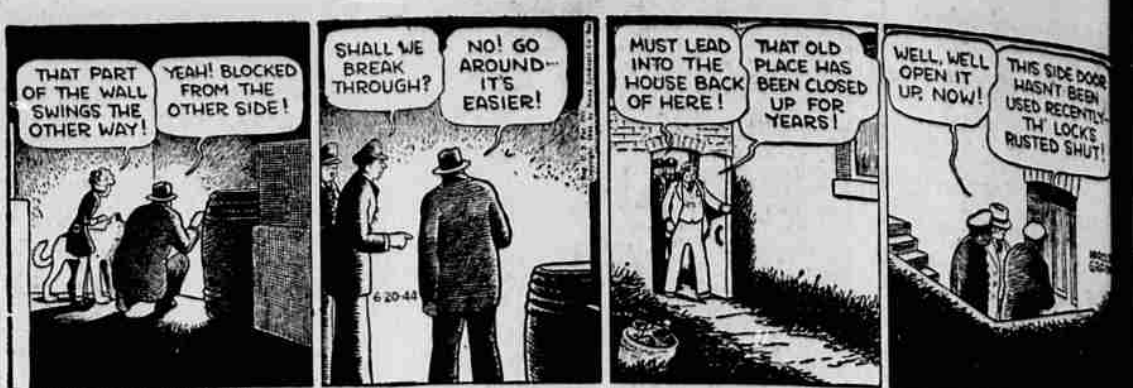
Oregon Sailor Missing; Another Wounded

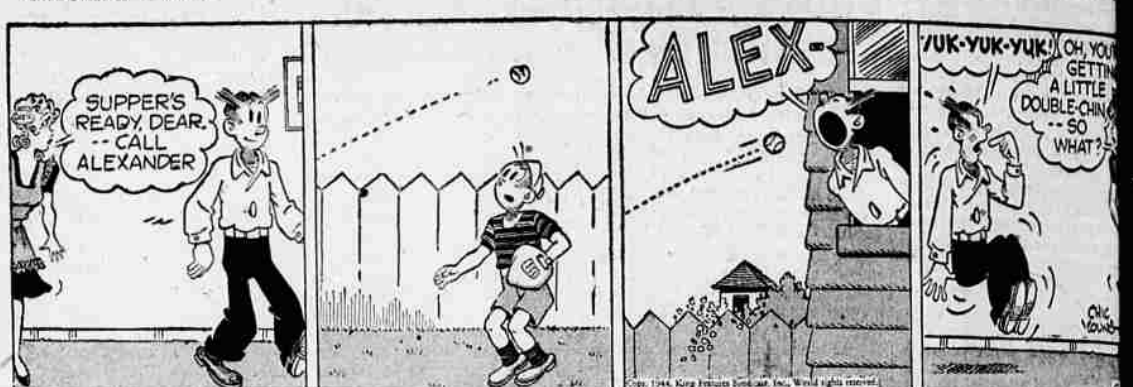
Klann served as motor machinist's mate, second class, in the naval reserve.
