Army Sends Experts to Help Conserve Vehicles

Two automotive experts from headquarters of the ninth service command, at Fort Douglas, Utah, will visit eight military establishments on the West Coast during the next three weeks to emphasize the present program of conservation and preventive maintenance and safe operation of army rolling equipment. They will be at Camp Adair July 1.

Major General David McCoach, Jr., commanding general of the command, said Major H. A. Phillips, chief, administrative motor vehicle maintenance for the command, and Ab Jenkins, Salt Lake City, internationally known car designer and builder, will visit the various installations.

A strict conservation program intended to extend well beyond the normal span of life of army vehicles was inaugurated months ago by General McCoach and is directed by the service command ordinance officer, Colonel H. J. Conway.
