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New Insecticide Use Likely To Be Delayed

SALEM, Ore.—(AP)—There will be no commercial or agricultural use of DDT, new insecticide, until after the war and several years of experimentation, J. D. Patterson, chief chemist of the Oregon department of agriculture, reported here after his return from a meeting of the national association of insecticide and disinfectant manufacturers last week.

DDT, chiefly known now as the chemical that halted a typhus epidemic in Naples in January, has tremendous possibilities, Patterson said. The new formula was the subject of the conference. Dr. Victor Froelicher, chemist for Gelsy and company, New York, which helped develop DDT, and which owns the patent, said it is being produced only for experimentation and for army use at present.

The toxicity of DDT is still comparatively unknown, Patterson said. And before it can be used on crops much work remains to be done.

The greatest problem of commercial use now is the use of DDT to kill destructive insects without harming beneficial ones, he reported. The best possibilities for immediate use are in the killing of flies, earwigs, ants, bedbugs, cockroaches, silverfish and similar household pests, he said. It may be five or 10 years before all angles of DDT's use have been worked out.

Pointers Given on Use of Strawberries

"Strawberries depend on their rare rich flavor and the retention of the fresh attractive red color for their popularity," according to Miss Jean Starker, emergency assistant to the home demonstration agent in the field of food preservation. They are not only luscious to eat but one serving will supply a good portion of the day's supply of Vitamin C. All these valuable assets we admire are well preserved when the berry is frozen, she added. Small sweet berries at the end of the season are best. They should be washed and then hulled. This minimizes the time the broken surface is exposed to the air and thus leaves less time for the Vitamin C to escape. The larger berries may be sliced and packed immediately in either alternate layers of dry sugar or in cold syrup. It is advised to save a generous layer for the top of the berries to help keep out the air. Miss Starker states further:

"When using syrup allow one half inch headspace for short pints, one inch for tall pints and one and a half inches for quart jars for expansion. Put in locker in containers of glass, tin, special waxed cardboard, or cardboard with special cellophane bag and close tightly. The inevitable exception to the rule is the glass container which should be left partially open until after freezing and then tightened air tight. Freeze strawberries as soon as possible after harvesting.

"Strawberries have a good color and remain plump when made into preserves by the following recipe:

"Four cups berries washed and hulled (do not use more at one cooking) cover with boiling water and pour it off immediately.

"Add two cups of sugar and boil three minutes.

"Let stand over night.

"Pack the next morning while cold into jars that have just been sterilized.

Seal with hot paraffin.

"The amount of sugar, however, in this recipe is large and probably 3-4 of this amount would make an acceptable product."

Pay Rise Approved For Fighting GI's

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Extra pay for infantrymen and gliderborne troops was voted Wednesday by the house military committee after it heard an off-the-record ecology of G I Joes by one of their leaders on a fighting front.

The committee approved legislation to give "expert infantrymen" engaged in combat duty a pay boost of \$10 monthly, those not in combat an additional \$5 and members of glider units the same 50 per cent pay increase now given paratroopers.

Maj. Gen. Miller G. White read a letter in support of the bill from a front-line commander commending Uncle Sam's foot-soldiers.

At their own request, the ma-

mines were excluded from provisions of the legislation.

Col. J. W. Knighton, representing the marine corps, said in a statement filed with the committee that the bill singles out one arm of the service, the infantry, to the detriment of other arms engaged in equally hazardous jobs. To apply it to the leather-necks, he added, would "tend to destroy a sense of unity which is a valuable military asset to the corps."

Jackson County Real Property Value Rises

MEDFORD—(AP)—Jackson county's real property taxable value for 1944-45 has been set at \$22,847,110 by Assessor C. A. Myers, a gain of \$252,550 over the 1943-44 fiscal year.

The personal property valuation was fixed at \$4,900,550, up \$150. Total taxable valuation, not including public utilities, increased \$252,700.

Districts Approve Special School Taxes

Oregon City, in an election which drew only a handful of voters, approved a 7-mill tax to be levied annually for the first five post-war years to raise \$200,000 for school improvement.

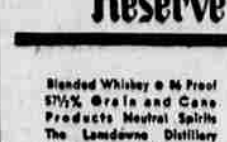

The war department reported Winstead was cited for bravery and "superb disregard of extreme danger."

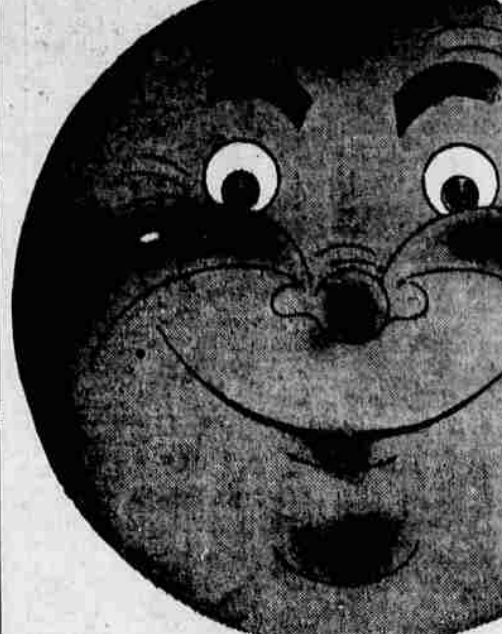
