Camp Adair Miracle— **Mess Staff Wins Praise**

CAMP ADAIR — The kitchen crew came into its own in the 882nd field artillery last Tuesday. Mess Sergeant Louis B. Mills of service battery and the members of his kitchen staff were honored by a special retreat parade and will receive three-day passes at "the earliest practicable date" by personal order of Brigadier General Peter P. Rodas, division artillery commander.
 It all started with Colonel Thomas F. Wallington, III corps assistant artillery officer, who wrote to General Rodas praising the meals served himself and his staff during recent battalion firing tests.
 "Although the number of personnel and the hour of serving varied from day to day," wrote Col. Wallington, "the meals were without exception served promptly, and the food was always hot. The dishes were excellently prepared, the equipment was spotless and the attitude of the kitchen conveyed the impression that serving meals in the field was a pleasure."
 General Rodas endorsed this commendation by adding his personal appreciation in a letter to Sgt. Mills. "I wish to commend you and the personnel of your mess crew. . . . The spirit displayed by all hands was exactly that which is desired. . . . I direct that each man involved be given a three-day pass at the earliest practicable date. . . ."
 And Lt. Col. Elmer F. Armbricht, 882nd Co. added: "I am

proud to have you and your crew in this battalion."
 The commendation and endorsements were read to the entire battalion at the retreat formation.

Rails Pool Resources **To Aid War Effort**

SEATTLE — (AP) — All Pacific coast railroads have pooled their resources, not only motive power and equipment, but also in diverting traffic from one railroad to another to aid the war effort. W. Hale, Southern Pacific vice president in charge of freight traffic, told the Pacific northwest advisory board here.
 "In the northwest we have been instrumental in routing through Portland thousands of carloads of lumber and other products originating on our lines in Oregon, that we would ordinarily handle east via Ogden or El Paso," he said. "It has been very costly."

U. S. Plywood Net **Reported at \$913,742**

NEW YORK — (AP) — United States Plywood corporation reports net profit after taxes but before renegotiation for the fiscal year ended April 30, of \$913,742 equal after preferred dividends to \$2.83 each on 299,932 common shares, compared with \$757,046 or \$2.91 each on 249,932 common shares in the preceding fiscal year. The report said earnings in the year ended in 1943 were after \$57,000 paid to the government in renegotiation. Sales amounted to \$20,563,000 against \$19,070,000 in 1943.

June Term of Circuit **Court Comes to Close**

The June term of circuit court came to an end Thursday afternoon when a directed verdict for the defendant was given in the case of the state against Lee Dozer, charged with polygamy.
 C. A. Perry, tried on a charge of larceny in a store, was acquitted by the jury, which returned its verdict Thursday afternoon.
 This term of court had been in session for two and a half weeks, which is somewhat longer than the terms of the past year or so.
