PAMPER YOUR WRINGER
Pamper the rubber wringer on your washing machine and make it last. One method is to provide a protective covering. A slip cover of canvas, feed sack fabric, or any other durable cotton will be suitable, says Nellie C. Lyle, county home demonstration agent.

To preserve the wringer, never store it where the sunlight will strike the rubber rolls is her advice. Loosen the tension of the wringer after each use, and rinse the soap from the rolls before wiping dry.

If rubber rolls become soft and sticky from poor care, they are difficult to replace these days, Miss Lyle adds.

USWV Ex-Chief to Eugene Convention

Scott Leavitt of Newberg, Ore., a past commander chief of the United Spanish War Veterans, will be at the state convention of these veterans, to be held in Eugene July 9-12, to represent Commander-in-Chief Guy Boyle, it is announced by Judd Stauffer, chairman of the general committee for the convention. Rev. E. A. Smith, Oregon department commander, who will preside at the encampment here, is now at Boise, Idaho, attending the department encampment of that state, representing the commander-in-chief there.

Hotel reservations for the encampment here are coming in every day, Stauffer said, and it has begun to look like there will be shortage of public accommodations. Private homes will probably have to be thrown open to many of the visitors. Delegates and others planning to attend from different parts of the state have written for reservations in auto camps but as a rule nearly all of the courts in Eugene, Springfield and surrounding territory are already filled with government employees, industrial workers and new families who have as yet not been able to find permanent locations.

Notwithstanding these conditions, Stauffer expresses confidence that the housing committee of the convention will be able to find accommodations for all the visitors.

Qualifying Classes For Instructors Due

Uni-Hi Students Among Best Informed In U. S.

Students of University high school come close to being the best informed high school students in the United States on the subject of current affairs. Howard Akers, their teacher, reports that in the recent current affairs quiz sponsored by Time magazine, the senior class scored the third highest median score among classes from 332 schools taking part. The median is the score above which 50 per cent of the scores fell.

Median score of the UHS juniors was the highest of any junior class reporting in the nation.

Two seniors in the U. S. tied for high score, 82 out of a possible 100. One of these two was Glenn Morgan Jr., of Uni-Hi, who is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Glenn S. Morgan of Eugene.

Highest score made in the UHS junior class was made by Ruth Clark, daughter of the late Dr. R. C. Clark of the University of Oregon history department.

Akers regards the record of these two UHS classes as an outstanding achievement, who competed with 358 other high schools and 83 junior colleges.

"I believe our young people," says Akers, "are pretty well informed regarding what is going on in the world—and more than that, I believe they have a pretty good understanding of the whole situation. We of Uni-Hi are proud of our kids and our school."
