Homers, Errors Spot Twin Bill

Just what got into the cellar dwelling Springfield Cardinals is a mystery but whatever it was it was for the better, for they went out on Civic Stadium field Sunday and in no questionable way licked the pants off the Giustina Reds 5-1, to further delay their chances of clinching the first half Cascade league championship, and the Miller Lumbermen, served notice that they were still trying, as they whacked the Snellstrom Braves 8-2.

Manager Ed Brauner's Reds now must overcome the Hill Creek nine in a Wednesday night tussle, before he can carry the pennant away, and a victory for the 'Bills would put the Giustina team in a deadlock with the Miller club.

Thomas Scores

Springfield broke the ice when manager Dale Thomas, teed off with single to left, went to second on a put out, and skidded to third on third baseman Dale Warberg's error. Attempting to steal second Warberg was put out, and Thomas came home for the first of the five Cardinal tallies.

Giustina pushed across their only run in the second also. Burt Avery singled to left and went to second and third on the second baseman's error. He came home on a steal, the old squeeze, but bunter Jug Faubion missed the bat and the ball rolled out towards the pitcher.

The Cards virtually won the ball game in the fourth—scoring three runs. Bud Boqua made first on shortstop Kenny King's error, and went to third when Carl Stevenson, Giustina center fielder bobbled Walt Peterson's single. Boqua came home on Thomas' second hit, and Peterson pulled up to third, Thomas going to second on the throw in. Ed Thennell then took over in the batting box, and laced out a single to right field, scoring his teammates.

Millers Win

Keeping their slim chances for the championship alive the Miller team with the aid of some heavy slugging had little trouble disposing of the Snellstrom club.

It all started in the second inning. Bud Nurre singled and went to third on an error that allowed Jack Walton to safely make first base. Bill Reeves then singled to score Nurre, and put Walton on the hot corner. Dan Moran then singled to bat in Walton, and he went to second on the throw in. Cliff Baxter stepped into a fat pitch to score Reeves and Moran before out number three was made.

In the fifth, Chet Simpson swatted the ball for four bases, and Bill Meye doubled to score Baxter who had previously walked. Then Bud Nurre poled out the second homer of the day to deep center-field.

Snellstrom made their two runs in the second and sixth. Ranny Smith scored the first when he singled through short, and went to second on Joe Oakes single, and third, when Walker was hit by Simpson. Charley Mickelson then singled off the pitcher's glove to score Smith.

Seven Pacific Coast league baseball teams were grouped so closely today that any one of them could be in first position by the end of this week's series.

Yesterday's doubleheaders saw Los Angeles move from seventh position into a four-way tie for fourth place with Seattle, Portland and Hollywood, while Oakland moved from sixth to third and San Diego from fifth to second. Only three and a half games separated the first-place San Francisco Seals and the four fourth-placers.

The Angels defeated Portland twice, 6-5, in the 10-inning opener, and 12-0 in the nightcap, to take a five-to-two edge in the week's series.

The Oakland A's ran their winning streak to five straight with a double victory over the Seattle Rainiers. Oakland took the lead in the first inning of the opener and coasted in with a 5-2 win. In the nightcap the A's broke a fifth-inning one-all tie with two runs and added three more in the sixth for a 6-2 edge. Seattle won only one game of the week's six.

Seals Split

San Diego was forced to go 10 innings to win the opener with the Hollywood Stars, 2-1, behind the two-hit pitching of Rex Cecil, then barely nosed out a 7-6 win in the eight-inning nightcap. The Padres won five of seven in the series.

League-leading San Francisco pounded out 12 hits off three Sacramento pitchers to win the opener 10 to 1, but the Solons won the nightcap 1-0, and took the series five to two.

In Saturday's games Sacramento beat the Seals 5-2, Los Angeles won over Portland 8-2, Oakland defeated Seattle 4-1, and Hollywood defeated the Angels 7-3.

St. Louis Takes Double Bill From Detroit; Faces Ordeal

NEW YORK, June 26.—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Browns today entrained for the east to undertake what may prove to be the crucial three weeks of the season in their quest for their first American league pennant.

If frame of mind has anything to do with winning games on this trip, St. Louis should be in. Yesterday the Browns swept a twin bill from the Detroit Tigers.

The double victory, 5-4 in the 10-inning opener, and 5-2 in the second, increased the Browns' league lead to four games. Gene Moore's single and Milt Byrne's double produced the marginal tally in the first game and gave 'ex Shirley the triumph. They continued where they had left off by counting three runs in the first inning of the nightcap to give Al Hollingsworth enough working margin.

Whiff

The Chicago White Sox climbed into second place with a twin victory over the Cleveland Indians, 11-0 and 4-3.

A four-run first inning proved to be just the margin Hank Borowy needed to gain a 4-3 victory for the New York Yankees in the opener, and Ernie Bonham scattered 10 hits for a 5-2 win in the first.

Washington and Boston split a pair, the Senators winning the first game 5-4, but losing the nightcap 4-0.

In the National league the St. Louis Cardinals stretched their league lead to nine and a half games over the second-place Pittsburgh Pirates with a 2-1 victory in the first game and the second was called after nine innings with the score tied at 5-5.

Phillies Lose

The Brooklyn Dodgers regained the first division with a double victory over the hapless Philadelphia Phils. Veteran Curtis Davis held the Phillies to seven hits to win the opener 4-1, and Rube Melton annexed the afterpiece 2-1 in 10 innings.

Bucky Walters won his 12th game as Cincinnati took the first of two games from the Chicago Cubs 4-3. Claude Passeau pitched four-hit ball in the nightcap to gain a 5-0 shutout for the Cubs.

New York and Boston split. Two errors and three singles in the first inning of the opener gave Boston's Charley Barrett a three-run working margin and he went on to win 5-1. Rookie Billy Voiselle won the nightcap for the Giants 4-1, with a three-hit performance—his 10th of the season.

Collegiate Stars Open Tournament

CHICAGO, June 26.—(U.P.)—Francisco Segura, the South American "swing" artist who used two hands to serve a tennis ball, defends his NCAA title today against a field of 50 collegiate stars at Northwestern university in a six-day tournament.

The singles competition opened this morning with the doubles rounds scheduled to begin Wednesday. Finals in both divisions will be run off Saturday.

Segura, University of Miami star, will battle players from 19 schools representing every section of the nation—most of them V-12 trainees who are taking advantage of a 10-day leave between terms to enter the competition.
