County Gets \$45,553 In Forest Receipts

Lane county has received \$45,553.27 as part of the 25-per cent fund distributed to Oregon counties from national forest receipts, J. R. Bruckart, supervisor of the Eugene office of the Willamette forest service announced Monday. This sum which is for the fiscal period ending June 30, 1943, is for county road and school funds, Bruckart advised.

The Lane quota was highest for the state which received an aggregate total of \$382,766.

National forests contributing 25 per cent of their receipts to the Lane road and school fund, besides the Willamette Forest, were the Siuslaw and the Umpqua, which have relatively small holdings within the county borders.

Bruckart reported that receipts for the current fiscal year will be considerably increased due to the step up in lumber production within the county with more national forest timber being sold to operators.

Increased Demand May Mean Paper Cut

Increasing demands by the army may make drastic cuts in civilian paper allocations necessary unless scrap paper drives throughout the nation continue to supply reprocessing plants from the one remaining reservoir of supply, the newspaper advisory committee of the war production board at Washington, D. C., Tuesday informed J. J. Kamerman, Lane county salvage chairman.

In a letter discussing the outlook for newspaper and other products of pulp wood, it was made very clear that all prophecies were based on a continuation and enlargement of present salvage drives.

The Lane county salvage depot is located at the fairground, Thirteenth and Monroe streets, and is open from 1 to 7 p.m. for the collection of magazines, newspapers, and paper cartons, Kemerman said.
