His prediction was based on an official survey. He said the maximum timber cut probably will be reached in about 20 years.

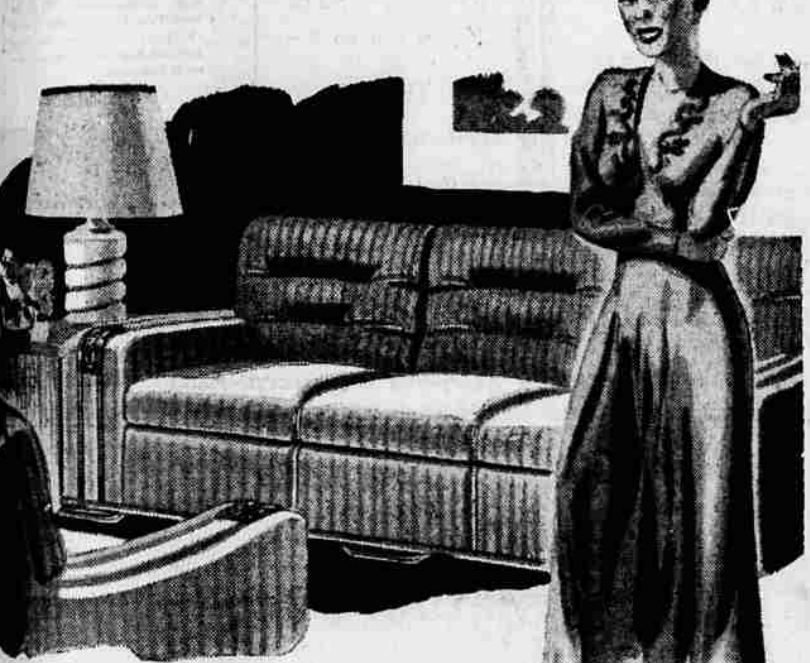
What Goes on at The Statehouse
SALEM, Ore.—(AP)—Most people, when you mention "state police" to them, think immediately of an anonymous blue car sliding along behind them which suddenly sprouts a siren, just before the driver pulls over to the curb.
Actually, the highway laws of the state comprise only a small part of the law-enforcing duties of the police department. They are merely the most noticed.
The state police are under the supervision of the secretary of state, and are charged with enforcement of all criminal laws, specifically with enforcement of penal provisions of the motor vehicle act, motor transportation act, the game code, and the commercial fisheries code. They are to detect crime, apprehend criminals and preserve law and order. Also, they maintain the state bureau of criminal identification.
Portlander in Charge
Superintendent of the police is Charles P. Pray of Portland. He is assisted by L. M. Brown, deputy superintendent, Charles H. McCles, captain of the game division, George A. Kanz, director of the bureau of criminal identification, and the many officers and patrolmen throughout the state.
The department is divided into four districts, with headquarters in Milwaukie, Salem, Medford and Baker.
As an example of their work in general law enforcement, the following figures come from their monthly report for May, 1944.
In crimes against persons, property and similar offenses, the police made a total of 300 arrests. Twenty-six of the persons arrested were acquitted, 29 cases are still pending, fines in connection with the crimes totaled \$2,682.20, and a total of 71.97 years in prison or jail were handed out in sentences.
A total of \$60 of the fines was remitted, while 13.15 years of the sentence time was suspended.
Offenses in this listing included those such as assault, of various types, manslaughter, offenses against the family and children, moral offenses, arson, burglary, vandalism, forgery, fraud, larceny, trespassing, delinquency, disorderly conduct, drunkenness, sanitary offenses and vagrancy.
Recover 38 Vehicles
The police recovered 38 stolen vehicles during that time, valued at \$25,300. They recovered \$3,938 worth of stolen property.
While this work is less well known, enforcing the game codes also is part of the state police job, including checking 2,698 bag limits (which were OK'd), making 107 arrests and giving 50 warnings.
A total of 288 complaints were investigated by the police during May, with 180 of them cleared. The complaints included everything from lost animals to murder. (Four lost animals were reported, three cleared; one charge of murder was cleared during the month.)
The best known activity of the police is, of course, its motor vehicle law enforcing job. They warned 3,832 motorists and arrested 1,582 during the month. Forty-nine of those arrested were acquitted, 91 cases are pending, and \$13,271.41 in fines were levied. Sentences amounted to 1,340 1/2 days.
It is a real job they do, those men in the anonymous blue cars. They spent 14,887 days in the field during the month, and traveled a grand total of 276,298 miles.

Salem Paper Gets New Managing Editor
SALEM, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—Charles A. Sprague, editor and publisher of the Oregon Statesman, today announced the appointment of Wendell Webb, San Francisco newspaperman, to the managing editorship of the paper.
Webb, a native of Ohio, worked on a number of Oregon newspapers previous to his transfer to San Francisco. He was a member of the Associated Press staff there, and for a time was assigned to the Pacific theater of war as a correspondent.
He has been associated with the McMinnville Telephone-Register, the Coos Bay Times and the Statesman. Webb replaces Ralph Curtis, who resigned to accept the editorship of the St. Helens Sentinel-Mist.
