**Buyer and Seller
 In Truck Sale Both
 Penalized by OPA**
 OPA means business — and
 quick, according to Wednesday's
 demonstration of its effectiveness
 in enforcing compliance with ceil-
 ing prices. It was the first case
 in the history of the local war
 price and rationing board that both
 buyer and seller have been de-
 clared in violation of price ceiling
 laws and have been "fined."
 Price panel of the local board
 was informed Tuesday by H. R.
 Brechtel, Rt. 2, that he intended
 to buy a truck for \$800 from J. N.
 McCutcheon, Springfield. Brechtel
 was told that the ceiling price on
 this particular truck was
 \$599.50, but he said he would pay
 the \$800 anyway because he had to
 have the truck, the board reported,
 warning him that he would be in
 violation of price control laws if
 he completed the sale.
 Wednesday morning, Brechtel
 and McCutcheon tried to clear sale
 of the truck through the board,
 supplied statements that \$800 had
 been paid for the truck. The panel
 noted the overcharge, told the seller
 that he would be required to
 make a refund of \$200.50, which
 McCutcheon voluntarily made.
 Brechtel, however, did not re-
 ceive the \$200.50 refund — it went
 to the treasurer of the United
 States. In cases where a buyer
 willingly and knowingly pays an
 overcharge, amount of the over-
 charge goes to the government.
