Army Reorders U.O. College Courses

Reorder of 9000 copies of college courses and the same number of high school courses by the United States Armed Forces institute, Madison, Wis., from the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education was announced this week by Miss Mozelle Hair, head of correspondence study.

These courses, which are issued by the institute to men in the armed forces for a small fee and which do not carry either college or high school credit, were first ordered in January of this year and the reorder came through on June 19. The courses are planned so a student can work them by himself, but upon submitting completed lessons to the institute headquarters, they are graded by an instructor.

College courses reordered are economic geography, 2000; office management, 1000; news writing, 2000; feature writing, 1000; engineering mathematics, part I, 1500; engineering mathematics, part II, 1500. High schools courses desired were economics, 1500; practical English usage, 2500; practical English usage, course II 2000; world history, 2000; world history, course II, 1000. In almost all cases the reorder is larger than the original order in January. Miss Hair said, although German composition with an original order of 1000 was not reordered, and in the high school bracket American history and civics did not receive a reorder.
