Q: What do you mean by "good theatre?"

A: This should not be confused with good theater, which is a place to go such as the McDonald or Heilig. Good theatre (so spelt) on the other hand, is a term venerated by professors of drama, producers, and directors who want their audience to receive the greatest dramatic impact possible from the situations. Simplified, the term refers to the development of a scene or plot so that the audience will feel intense interest in the build-up alone, regardless of people and fixings. Revelations of secrets, miracles, murders, etc., always make good theatre if they are prepared for with care; for example, the finding of the lost Curly, the caterpillar, near the close of "Once Upon a Time," the vision and the healings in "The Song of Bernadette," the discovery of personal belongings which told the heroine identity of the murderer in "Phantom Lady."

Somerset Maugham called one of his novels "Theatre," in which the title word certainly referred to more than the fact that the book told of the later life of an actress. Books could be written on subject of this question, and probably have been. For a better and more complete description, see a good handbook on stage technique, acting, directing, or other work on legitimate theatre.

### Suggestions Given On Freezing Peas

EDITOR'S NOTE: Below is another of the series of articles prepared by the county nutrition committee regarding preparation and freezing of vegetables and fruits. Other suggestions will be run from time to time.

Fresh garden peas with their sweet rich flavor and attractive green color are now available on the markets in Lane county. Would you like to preserve these vitamin packed balls for attractive winter meals. According to our state authorities this is best done by freezing. Garden peas when just at the right stage for eating, will be sweeter if picked in the morning than at the end of the day. To hold the sweetness the vegetable must be kept in a cold place after picking and not kept too long.

Although a few people have had success without blanching peas before freezing you are more certain to have a good product if you blanch in boiling water. The shelled peas may be placed in a wire basket or colander one quart at a time. Lower the basket into a large kettle containing three gallons of boiling water and cover tightly. Count time when water boils again. At the end of two or three minutes place in cold running water and cool thoroughly. Drain and pack into containers for freezing. The best containers are airtight. Keep them cool and hurry them to the locker.

Directions for freezing other foods can be found in Extension Bulletin 623 "Food Preservation by Freezing." This is available for your asking at the home demonstration agent's office in the Public Market building in Eugene.

### Pacific First Federal Dividend to Be Paid

Semi-annual dividend of more than \$200,000 will be paid June 30 by the Pacific First Federal Savings and Loan association of Tacoma, it was announced Thursday by Frank Cashman, manager of the Eugene branch. Pacific's assets, he said, now are above \$28,000,000, an all-time high. More than \$8,000,000 is in government bonds; surplus and reserves total more than \$1,800,000. The association is servicing more than 8000 home loans and contracts, and is doing business with more than 60,000 patrons, said Cashman.

## Childers Fired Rocks and Bullets

Lt. Ernest Childers, Creek Indian and hero of action at Oliveto, Italy last September, who will appear here Monday at 7 p.m. at civic stadium, is using his leave and part of his time in the U. S. on the army's rotation policy to sell war bonds.

Childers will be featured with T-Sgt. Charles E. "Commando" Kelly at the huge war bond event, which will also feature a baseball game of picked teams sponsored by Lane county lumbermen and labor unions. Admission to the game and personal appearance of the two war heroes will be by ticket only, obtained with purchase of war bonds at Eugene banks.

His citation for bravery in action, last September in Italy, said: "Although Lieutenant Childers had just previously suffered a fractured instep he, with eight enlisted men, advanced up a hill toward enemy machine gun nests. The group advanced to a rock wall overlooking a corn field, and Lieutenant Childers ordered a base of fire laid across the field so that they could advance. When he was fired upon by two enemy snipers from a nearby house he killed both of them."

"He moved behind the machine gun nests and killed all occupants of the nearer one. He continued toward the second one and threw rocks at it. When the two occupants of the nest raised up, he shot one. The other was killed by one of the eight enlisted men. Lieutenant Childers continued his advance toward a house farther up the hill and,

## Women Farm Labor Recruiting Planned

Leaders of women's organizations met at the Baptist church Wednesday night to further the movement for the recruitment of women labor to assist in harvesting Lane county's food crops this season. There was an attendance of 45 women, representing 39 different organizations. Mrs. Frank Dunlap, chairman of the women's land army and community committee, presided.

Mrs. Mabel Mack, assistant leader of the farm labor project at the state college, outlined to the group the plan of registration and recruitment through the different women's organizations, and Harry Bower, farm labor assistant in charge of the farm labor office here, explained the serious need of additional help. He also outlined the procedure to obtain additional gasoline for cars used by the farm laborers.

Miss Marie Ridings, woman's farm labor assistant, told of the local recruitment situation and distributed blanks for the enrollment of women in the different organizations.

The first work which the women recruited by these organizations will be called upon to do will be bean picking, which will start early in August.

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
