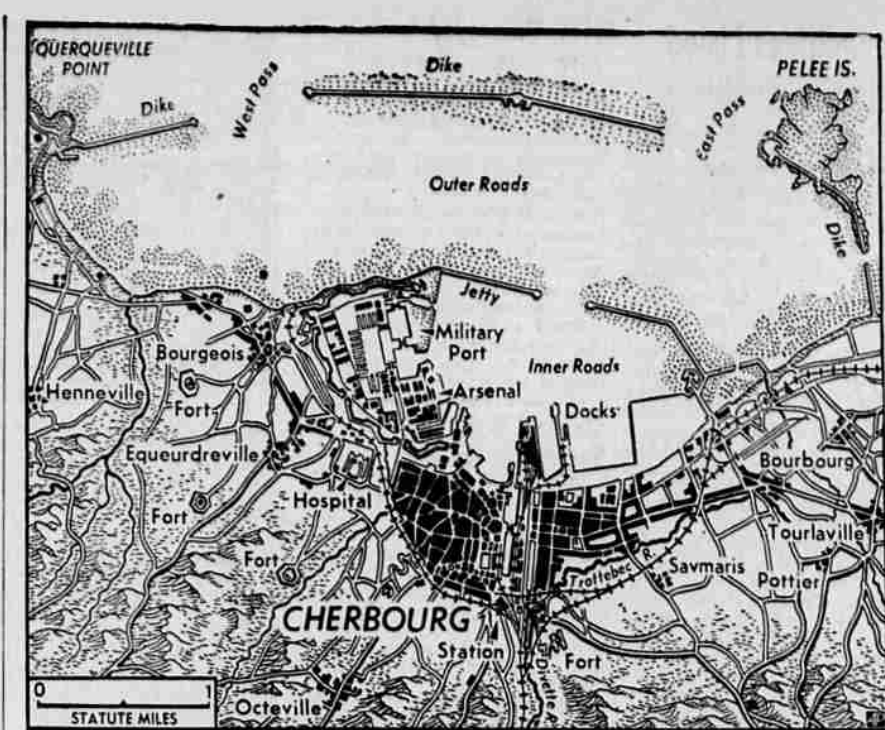

son worked up through the union ranks to the presidency of the Portland Central Labor council in 1919. Later he became business agent and secretary of the Portland building trades.

The former carpenter, who applied for his first union card at the age of 14, rose to a high post in the AFL on a platform of opposition to "labor terrorism."

"Critical economic conditions," he declared in 1939 when he was re-elected by the largest referendum vote ever cast, "can be met and successfully overcome only by earnest teamwork by business, employers and workers."

During depression days he was supervisor of labor relations for the WPA. At the time of his death Nickerson was a member of Oregon's post-war readjustment commission, the county civil service commission, the county housing authority and the regional war labor board.

The widow, Anna, two sons, Delmore and Raymond, and a grandson and a brother survive.

Nye-Stambaugh Race Still Undecided

FARGO, N. D., June 30.—(P)—The official count of the state canvassing board Aug. 1 may be necessary to determine the republican nominee for United States senator in North Dakota.

In one of the closest races in this state in years, the incumbent, Gerald P. Nye, had increased his lead today to 921 votes over Lynn U. Stambaugh, Fargo attorney and former national commander of the American Legion, in nearly complete unofficial returns from Tuesday's primary. Only 47 scattered precincts of 2,251 were missing today, and Nye had 37,993; Stambaugh 37,072; Congressman Usher L. Burdick 34,769 and A. C. Townley, founder of the nonpartisan league 1,320.

the still-widening bridgehead across the Odon river some five miles southwest of Caen, was supported by the big guns of the British battleship Rodney, lying off the allied beaches to the north. The Rodney's guns have a range of 33,000 yards (nearly 19 miles).

Marshal Erwin Rommel, who is now reported rushing strategic reserves to Normandy from both Germany and France, tried to cut off the British Odon salient with one heavy and three smaller counterattacks, but all were broken up.

(The Paris radio declared in a broadcast early today that British and Canadian troops had landed on the east bank of the Orne estuary and had captured the port of Cabourg, four miles beyond, but there was no allied report of operations that far to the eastward.)
