Soldier Vote Machinery Is Set Up In Western Camps

Soldier voting officers' and assistant voting officers will be appointed at 56 posts, camps, and stations, including 11 general hospitals, in the ninth service command, it was announced Saturday by Major General David McCoch, Jr., commanding general, at his headquarters at Fort Douglas, Utah.
Voting officers are being appointed throughout the command, consisting of the states of Montana, Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona and Nevada, to carry out the provisions of public law 277, enacted by the 78th congress.
"The importance of the assignment and duties of the soldier voting officer cannot be stressed too highly," General McCoch wrote in a personal letter to all commanding officers, stressing that each give it his personal attention.
"It is important that the voting officer or his assistant be available at all times to render advice and assistance to each and every

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Veterans Awaiting Details on GI Bill

Veterans of Lane county are awaiting news on how to proceed to obtain benefits provided under the GI bill of rights recently signed by President Roosevelt. As soon as information is received by Mike Moriarty, veterans service officer in the United States employment office, it will be released for information of the veterans.
The broad terms of the GI bill provide:
1. \$20 weekly unemployment compensation for 52 weeks during first two years after war.
2. For veterans under 25 or those over 25 who can prove education interrupted by war: \$500 annual tuition plus \$50 a month for single men, \$75 for men with dependents, for up to four years schooling. (Must have served 390 days to qualify.)
3. Government guarantee of 50 per cent—maximum \$2000—of private or public loans at 4 per cent interest for veterans to enter business, farming, or buy homes. Veterans' administration absorbs interest charges first year, loans repayable on a 20 year period.
4. Job-finding agency established under director of selective service, chairman of war manpower commission, veterans' administrator.
5. \$500,000,000 hospital construction program for veterans.
6. Benefits received under bill to be deducted from any future general bonus paid by federal government.
