

Connally Predicts Thumbail Platform

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Chairman Tom Connally (D.-Tex.) of Senate foreign relations committee, predicted here the 1944 democratic platform will be "very strong" with just a few things in it among them a foreign policy "strong enough to mean something."

His forecast of a "very short" term added strength to reports that the democrats would counter the 4,000 or more word republican platform with a thumbnail statement in the briefest language determination to take all steps to speed victory and insure continued peace.

Connally, a prominent democratic congressman,

men here have made no secret of the fact that the republicans placed them on the political hot spot with their detailed planks appealing to almost every segment of the voting population.

On many issues, the democrats could equal the republican pledges.

But to match the GOP's racial planks, which opposed racial discrimination and endorsed anti-lynch and anti-poll tax laws, the democratic leadership would run the risk of losing the support of southern democrats who already are thinking of a bolt because of the Roosevelt administration's past support of just such legislation.

A thumbnail platform, pledging all efforts to hasten victory but skirting direct commitment on the racial issues, would probably appease the rebellious southerners in Texas, South Carolina and Mississippi.

Graveyard On Saipan Tells Island's History

A REGIMENTAL HEADQUARTERS, Saipan, June 26.—(Delayed)—On a small hill between Charan Kanoa and Garapan is a half-acre graveyard, where in the first terrible 48 hours of battle for this island, American shellfire and Japanese mortars and artillery rained destruction over the burial ground. It is the Catholic cemetery where hundreds of converted, Spanish-speaking natives lie buried. There are weather-stained wooden crosses, and flat concrete monuments pitted with shell holes. Duds and pieces of shrapnel litter the burial ground.

Christ In Center
In the center of the plot a cast metal figure of Christ is crucified on an eight-foot concrete cross.

During the early part of the battle great, jagged pieces of shrapnel sprayed across graves

and blew a six-cornered hole through a marble monument less than 10 feet from the crucifix.

The cross itself was pitted, and the little, inverted-V roof above the Savior was torn and splintered.

But only one piece of shrapnel struck the metal figure of Christ. It was a tiny fragment, and incredible as it may seem—it penetrated the figure's side at almost the exact point where the New Testament says the Roman centurion's spear was thrust.

Crucifix Faces North
The crucifix faces to the north, where the battle continued after the coastal plain was won, and toward a white concrete angel set on a round cement base.

The angel's left hand is missing, shattered by a bomb blast. From the somewhat primitively-modeled face realistic green glass eyes look out over the disturbed graves to the blue sea beyond.

Despite the ravages of warfare, the cemetery like all cemeteries tells its own story. There are ancient, sunken graves dug and marked in the days of the Spanish occupation. There are others with flat markers in the form of the Maltese cross—the resting places of Christians buried during the German tenure which followed the Spanish-American war.
