Leaders to Help Solve Post-War Issues Named
NEW YORK.—(AP)—Creation of a group of prominent American business, banking and educational leaders to assist in solving post-war international economic problems, was announced here.
Winthrop W. Aldrich, chairman of the board of the Chase National bank, said the group has been named the committee on international economic policy, and already has begun a study of post-war world-trade problems. The group, organized in co-operation with the Carnegie endowment for international peace, proposed a simultaneous conference at which "a simultaneous and general adjustment of all trade barriers" could be incorporated into "an international economic charter."

Oregon's War Jobs Total \$1,478,678.000
SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(AP)—War contracts awarded to Washington total \$5,786,754,000 since June 1, 1940, and to Oregon \$1,478,678,000, the San Francisco chamber of commerce reported in a tabulation made public last night.

Post-War Outlook For Klamath Show
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Post-war development of Klamath county depends largely on its forests and irrigated farms, a survey released by the Bonneville power administration, said today.
An additional 1500 jobs could be furnished by expansion of agriculture, food processing, new wood products and the tourist trade, the report added.

Oregon Scout Gets Five Japs

SAIPAN, June 20.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Marine PFC M. T. Barringer, Gretna, Ore., found his Garand rifle more effective than his flame-thrower when he became a scout in an advance guard foxhole one night and killed at least five members of a Japanese patrol.
For some time while Barringer was standing guard only two cows penetrated the American front lines. But Barringer was "suspicious and alert for Japs."
When they appeared he had his rifle ready and shot five. The men with Barringer apparently got 10 more because 15 bodies were found the next day.

One Escaped Convict Still Being Sought
WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 6.—(AP)—Harold Hardesty, 28, Seattle grocery store robber, was still at large today after his sensational escape from the state penitentiary Tuesday night and authorities searched for a pickup truck in which he was believed to have fled.
Hardesty's companion in the escape, Edward L. Yager, 30, serving a life term for slaying three persons in a Seattle speakeasy three years ago, was recaptured on the prison grounds yesterday, 10 hours after the break.

Junk Dealer Finds Ceiling On Drums
Ceiling prices on 55-gallon used steel drums is \$2.75, a local junk dealer found out Wednesday.
Called before the price panel of the local rationing board, he admitted selling these drums—which are used for gasoline, oil, and other liquids—for \$7.50 each. He said he knew he would be required to make restitution for these overcharges through the treasurer of the United States.
Amount of the "refund" is not known to date, the board said, but will be computed after an inventory of the dealer's stock has been made.

Morgenthau Helps OPA on Sandwiches
WASHINGTON.—(AP)—When Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau was charged 19 cents for a sandwich at a Chicago lunch counter recently, and protested at a subsequent press conference that the price was excessive, he apparently got results.
The treasury said today it had received word that the same lunch counter now is selling sandwiches for a dime. Morgenthau's Chicago visit was in connection with the fifth war loan drive.

Miss Starker Tells Of Freezing Spinach
EDITOR'S NOTE: Below is another in the series prepared by the county nutrition council on preservation of foods for winter use.

Winful thinkers have often visualized eating fresh tender leafy greens in mid-winter and now this dream has come true. These are now available in the local markets and the frozen product is the answer for good out of season eating.
Let us take spinach for an example. It is easy to prepare and will give your meals a touch of spring this winter.
First of all it is important to

select spinach of the right maturity. The frozen product can be no better in quality than the fresh product. Cut off the roots, sort and wash several times by dipping leaves from water and blanch either in boiling water two minutes or in steam three minutes. If you use the boiling water method the spinach is placed in a wire basket or colander and slipped into boiling water. Count time when the water boils again. In the steam blanching have about two inches of vigorously boiling water. The spinach is placed in a wire basket or colander and is placed above the water level and the time counted when steam escapes from under the lid again.
After blanching, cool the vegetable in cold running water; it should then be drained and placed in an airtight container.
Some good rules to follow are: freeze the same day harvested, handle quickly, keep it cool while waiting, and hurry to the locker. For the directions for freezing
