

Port Commission, City Council Meet

REEDSPORT — The regular meeting of the Port of Eugene commission was held Monday. This being the date set for objections to the port budget as published, and no objections being made or filed, the budget for the year 1944-45 was adopted. As sufficient funds are now on hand to meet all anticipated expenses for the current fiscal year, no tax levy was made. Commissioner H. T. Lewis reported on the matter of the proposed boom site applied for by Russell J. Hubbard and it appearing that the application had been refused by the war department, no action was taken. Commissioners James W. Ford and Lewis also reported on the necessity of dredging certain portions of the Smith river channel and were authorized to proceed at once with this project.

The July meeting of the ReedSPORT city council was held Monday evening. In addition to it being a council meeting the hearing on the proposed budget also was held. There being no objections to the published budget, the same was unanimously adopted and an ordinance levying a tax in the sum of \$12,700 was introduced and passed.

Another ordinance levying a tax in the sum of \$13,000 for the fiscal year 1944-45 was introduced, read and adopted. This latter ordinance carries into effect the will of the electors of the city who recently voted special tax levies for parks, playgrounds, fire, street improvements and improvements to the city water system, such levies to extend over a period of from two to five years. Another ordinance was adopted amending the present ordinance relative to salaries of city officials by increasing the same to conform with the 1944-45 budget.

Fire Department
Fire Chief M. M. Kelly reported on the recent trip made by Lester Johnson and himself to the fire chiefs' convention at Portland. Kelly also reported that he had purchased an additional 500 feet of 2 1/2" hose and such purchase was approved by the council. Upon motion the police committee was appointed to act as a fire committee in addition to present duties and was authorized to make purchases of items of fire equipment from time to time up to the value of \$100.00 without first securing the consent of the entire council.

A general discussion was held as to the matter of investment of certain sinking funds now on deposit with local bank and it was decided that the city purchase \$20,000.00 of current issue of 2% United States bonds.

Complaint was made to the council as to the excessive radio interference now current in many parts of the city and the matter was referred to the light committee for investigation and report.

The city water commissioner was instructed to purchase 60 feet of 18" concrete culvert to be installed under Highway 101 to carry 12" water pipe.

George M. Radich offered his resignation to the council regretting that his removal from the city would prevent him from continuing his duties as a member. The resignation was accepted and a former councilman, S. S. Smiley, was appointed to fill the vacancy.
