Mrs. Muriel Hurst of California is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Pike.

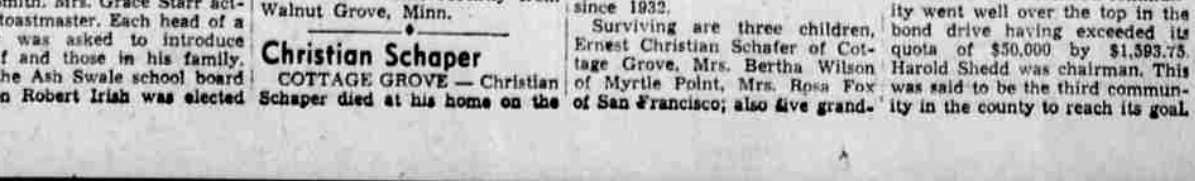
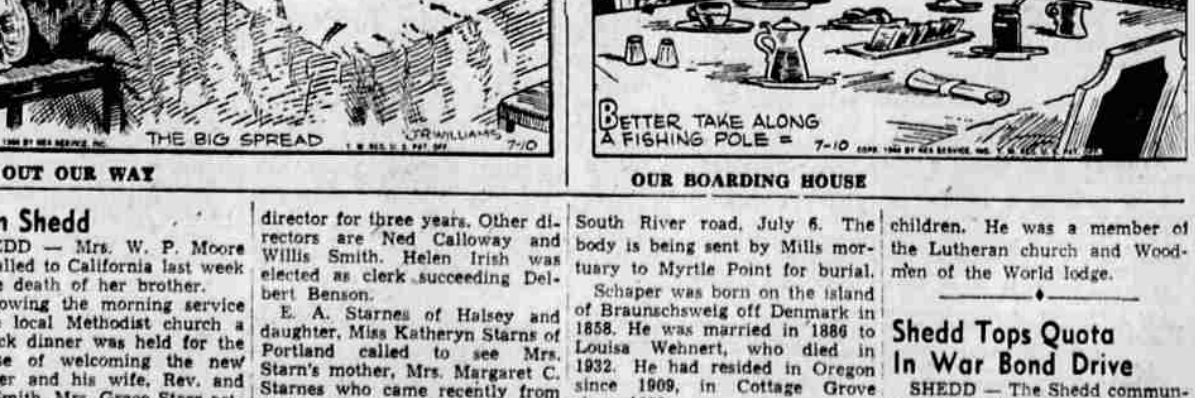
Harold Hooker was home on furlough for a few days visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Hooker.
