Public Market
 Canning 'cots are here, and this week will see the clean-up of apricots from California. Oregon-grown 'cots from The Dalles and from Yakima, Wash., are now coming in. They sell at \$3.50 per lug. The market warns that those who intend to can Royal Anne or Bing cherries had better be getting them. The reason, canneries are offering high prices, and growers may decide to deliver all their crops to them instead of taking them into the market. Cherries are 15c per lb. in canning lots, 2 lbs. for 35c in smaller lots. It's definitely berry season in the market—strawberries, of course, are gone, unless a few of the later varieties reappear in small amounts; but raspberries are present in quantities for canning—\$2.25 per crate, or in some places they can be had for \$4.25; a few loganberries are in the stalls, and youngberries are beginning to be plentiful. Loganberries sell at 20c per box, youngberries at 15c, but youngberries may be had by the crate at \$4.75. Raspberries in the market are cherry plums, 10c lb.; fresh figs, 25c lb.; black-cap raspberries, 2 boxes for 45c; the first seedling grapes, 35c per lb.; green apples, 3 lbs. 35c; the first Oregon peaches, 25c and 30c per basket. Rubarb may be had, 2 lbs. for 35c.
