

Sheriff And Staff Report Busy Year

A total of 1804 cases of all kinds was handled by the office of Sheriff O. E. Crowe for the year ending June 30, it was announced in the annual report given from his office Wednesday morning. The 1804 total included 1021 civil cases, 614 criminal, and 169 miscellaneous.

The sheriff and his staff put in 19,914 hours as follows: 1248 on civil cases; 2692 on criminal; 8089 on miscellaneous; 7885 under the jail listing.

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Ceilings Announced On Red Sour Cherries

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Maximum prices for 1944 red sour cherries for table use or home canning slightly higher than last year's were announced today by the office of price administration.

Effective July 18 retail prices in containers will be 18 cents per pound for cherries with stems or 16 without stems, OPA said. FOB shipping point prices are 11 cents per pound with stems, 9 and three-fourths cents without stems in containers or two cents less without containers, the announcement said.

Ceilings for cherries delivered to wholesale receiving point are 10 cents plus freight plus actual cost of protective services.

OPA officials said these ceilings are "designed to return to the grower \$155 per ton on 7 and three-fourths cents per pound, which represents estimated parity during the harvest."

Ceilings do not apply to cherries sold and shipped before July 18.

mathematics; the simple and direct methods being used for understanding machines and their operation; and the element of motivation that the army and navy have as a great advantage over formal education.

"But our end products are so different that I think we will find serious difficulties in adapting the motivating processes of the armed forces, however; their end product being to kill men efficiently, our ultimate goal being to make them live efficiently," the superintendent commented.

Balanced Program

One big current dilemma for education is how to develop a balanced program of education, he stated. "Our task is to emphasize both practical and theoretical, but to find the balance necessary for complete living," Dr. Gunn added.

"Discipline of free men is another problem facing America. Teaching discipline for democracy is a highly complex process, and the best procedure seems to be to have a school environment and a school life organized deliberately to give boys and girls experience in democratic living," the speaker said.

He pointed to the following guiding principles in this procedure:

- 1—Teach the true nature of democracy.
- 2—Teach youth to have a high regard for the general welfare.
- 3—Teach students the dangers of demagoguery and of the demagogue.
- 4—Teach common loyalties—the interest of all the people as paramount in democracy.
- 5—Teach the heritage of freedom which we have received and which we must cherish and improve.

In closing, Dr. Gunn said he had a belief in community relationships and said the boys and girls, the public schools, need the help and interest of all such groups as Lions clubs.

Ultimatum Given Reds At Monetary Parley

BRETTON WOODS, N. H., July 12.—(AP)—The American delegation to the United Nations monetary conference has served a virtual ultimatum on Soviet union representatives demanding a final answer on the all-important question of quotas to a proposed multi-billion dollar currency stabilization fund.

This was learned today from an unimpeachable conference source who added that the Russian group indicated a reply from Moscow might be expected by nightfall. He said he was "quite hopeful" the answer would be favorable.

Russia is known to be seeking a quota larger than \$1,000,000,000 originally assigned to her in a tentative draft of the stabilization fund proposal and at the same time to be demanding credit for her war-devastated areas.

COLOMBIA CHIEF FREED

BOGOTA, Colombia, July 12.—(AP)—President Alfonso Lopez resumed power in Colombia today after rebellious army officers, who had kidnapped him and several other high officials, were captured while attempting to flee toward Ecuador.

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Sales of Fifth Loan Bonds Keep Going

Active solicitation has ceased, and the official "closing date" has passed, but the fifth war loan drive will not be ended until July 31, it is reported in a telegram to John R. Snellstrom, county war finance chairman, from Kenneth G. Martin of the state war finance committee.

Sales of series E, F, and G cleared through the federal reserve bank by 3 p. m. on that date will be included in the loan, Martin said.

Coincidentally, Lane Chairman L. Clifton Culp announced that the county's total sales to date come to \$5,745,870. Only \$255,000 in war bonds must be purchased during the rest of this month to bring the total to six million.

Of the \$1,591,000 quota for E bonds, \$1,288,218 has been listed. "Urges all workers to continue their splendid work," Martin said. "Ask all banks to put special emphasis on F and G bonds. Oregon led the nation in the fourth war loan, but today we are tied with Washington in seventeenth place with only 54 per cent of our E-bond quota officially cleared through federal reserve. Check all issuing agents to see that stubs are sent in and your county gets federal reserve bank credit. Only official figures will be publicized."

At the Heilig:

FOLLOW THE BOYS

The parade of all-star musicals continues with Universal's "Follow the Boys." The title refers to the taking of "name" entertainers to the camps, the boats, wherever the boys are fighting. At intervals throughout the narrative, involving the marital quarrels of a dance team (George Raft and Zorina), are spotted personal appearances of 18 stars who either sing, dance, or caper characteristically, brief views of 19 more, and performances by the dance bands of Charlie Spivak, Freddie Slack, Ted Lewis, and Louis Jordan.

Such personnel can hardly produce mediocre entertainment, so you are treated to the singing of Jeanette MacDonald, Dinah Shore, Delta Rhythm Boys, Andrews Sisters, Sophie Tucker, Donald O'Connor and Peggy Ryan; a piano solo by Artur Schnabel; Mariene Dietrich, assisting Orson Welles in his magic show; Carmen Amaya's dancing; W. C. Fields' humorizing; and the dog act of Gaudier's Bricklayers. There is enough variety that no one should feel cheated.

The story is not too credible or interesting, so, for once in a picture of this type, the acts come as more of a relief than an interruption. However, this plot has more heart than that of most "realistic" musicals. Fans should be informed, too, that they will get an ending they don't expect.

Where we found "Follow the Boys" most interesting was in the description of organization of USO camp shows, Hollywood victory committee, and other groups allied with the war activities committee of the motion picture industry. Though the film comes from Universal, that studio does not try to hog all the credit for the work and cooperation which these groups have done and which has been appreciated by both public and "the boys."

Dry Holes Frequent In Texas Oilfields

DALLAS, Tex., (AP)—Nearly half of the oil wells drilled in Texas during 1943 turned out to be dry holes, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association reported here.

The association said the search for oil in Texas last year was "the worst disappointment for the petroleum industry" since oil first was found in commercial quantities in the state in 1889.

The report said that of 4421 holes drilled in both new and proven territory in Texas last year, a total of 1908—or 43 per cent—were dry.

Plane Crash Death Toll Mounts To 16

SOUTH PORTLAND, Me., July 12.—(AP)—The number of dead in the crash of a light army plane into a 100-unit war workers' trailer camp here reached 16 today and five injured persons continued on the Maine general hospital danger list. Seven others were still hospitalized. None of the identified victims is from Oregon.

An undetermined number of trailer occupants suffered injuries and were given treatment at the scene after the plane ploughed into the camp late yesterday while trying to make a landing at the nearby Portland municipal airport.

Eight of the dead, three of them children, remained unidentified. Army authorities reported the instrument panel of the plane had been "stolen" overnight and appealed for its return to aid them in their investigation.

SPY EXECUTED

LONDON, July 12.—(AP)—Joseph Jan van Hove, a former Antwerp waiter who arrived here from Belgium last Feb. 11 posing as a refugee, was executed at Pentonville prison today as a German spy—the 16th person to be executed in Britain for espionage since the beginning of the war.

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Wife Of Captured Marine Gives Twelfth Pint Of Her Blood

SALEM, Ore., July 12.—(UP)—The young woman was slender and brown-haired. She asked that her name not be used. She was lying on a cot in the Salem Red Cross blood donor headquarters, and smiling cheerfully. She had just given her 12th pint of blood to the Red Cross—blood which will be made into plasma and will perhaps save the life of a marine fighter somewhere.

She is the wife of a marine, and she has not seen her husband since December, 1941, when she and her daughter sailed from the Philippines and left him there.

She received three postcards from him last Christmas, "The happiest Christmas of my life." They were postmarked from a Japanese prison camp, the same camp from which came the atrocity stories which shocked the world earlier this year. She hasn't heard from him since.

Yes, she said, she would be proud to wear the "gallon club" emblem, given by the Red Cross for donors who have given 12 pints of blood.

And she will come back to give more. "It's the least I can do," she said.

hundred yards along the Carantan-Periers road northwest of St. Lo before captured Sainteny.

A headquarters spokesman said German armor was being worn down constantly, but still was strong enough to strike back vigorously in the Caen area, where a majority of Rommel's panzers were concentrated.

At the eastern end of the front, the Germans broke off their counterattacks around Caen after driving the British and Canadians out of Louvigny, two miles southwest of the inland port, another front dispatch said.

Lt. Gen. Miles C. Dempsey's British 2nd army, however, retained its hold on high ground overlooking the Orne river near its confluence with the Odon below Caen and gained further ground both in the Colombelles suburb east of Caen and the Hotot area south of Tilly-sur-Seuilles.

Italian Prisoners Reach Camp Adair

SALEM — (AP)—A company of fewer than 200 Italian prisoners arrived at Camp Adair last Friday to work at salvage operations in the cantonment. Capt. Douglas McKay, post public relations officer, said here.

McKay said he does not know whether more prisoners will be received at the camp.

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Wallace Expected To Get FDR Nod

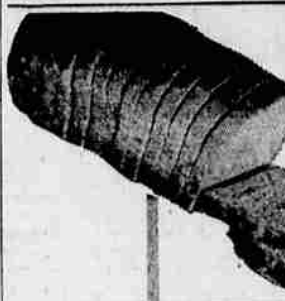

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, having accepted in advance a fourth term nomination which long had been assured, was reported ready today to recommend—but not demand—a second term for Vice-President Wallace.

The decision clinching the nomination ahead of time produced conjecture that Roosevelt probably would pass up a formal acceptance speech to the democratic national convention, either in person or by radio.

Selection of a vice-presidential candidate is the single major chore remaining for the convention starting a week from today in Chicago. Roosevelt is expected to lend a hand with it by nudging the delegates toward Wallace.

Today or tomorrow the chief executive may let it be known that Wallace is his preference for a running mate, but that the convention is free to make its own choice.



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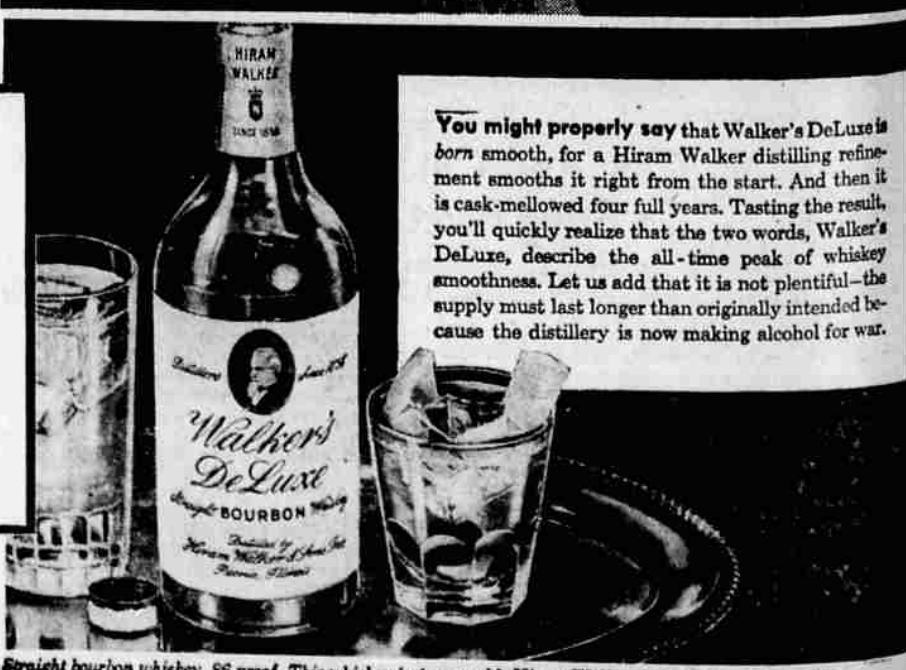
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
