Junction's Council Takes Up Reports

JUNCTION CITY — A regular meeting of the city council was held Monday night in the council chambers of the city hall, the acting mayor, C. A. Scott, presiding.

An application from the residential district asking permission to keep two cows was rejected by the council.

The building ordinance was discussed relative to the kind of foundations, continuous cement or cement blocks, which may be placed beneath buildings as alterations and or repairs. City Attorney Ira Peterson was asked to read the ordinance and render an opinion and interpretation at the next council meeting. A library report for the month of June was read by Councilman Carothers.

City recorder Clyde Shields reported a \$4,409.47 cash balance in the general fund as of June 30, end of the fiscal year. Shields also reported a \$1000.00 bond purchased from the water department fund. A survey of city streets signs is to be made and distinct signs repaired for the benefit of the fire department when answering calls. The fire department urges citizens to report fires by naming the streets forming the nearest intersection.

The street and alley department was placed in charge of the street sign survey. The auditing committee will meet at the office of the city recorder, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings, July 18 and 19, for the purpose of auditing city accounts for the past year. E. Carothers will act as committee chairman. C. A. Scott and J. D. Mills are other committee members. The next meeting of the council will be held Monday, August 7.

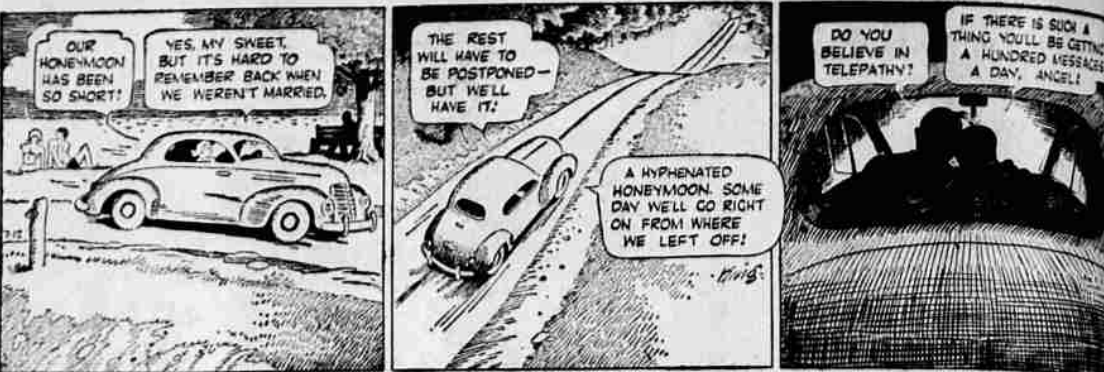
Mr. Baldridge having recently dispersed the logging operations in Redspout to the E. K. Wood Lumber company.

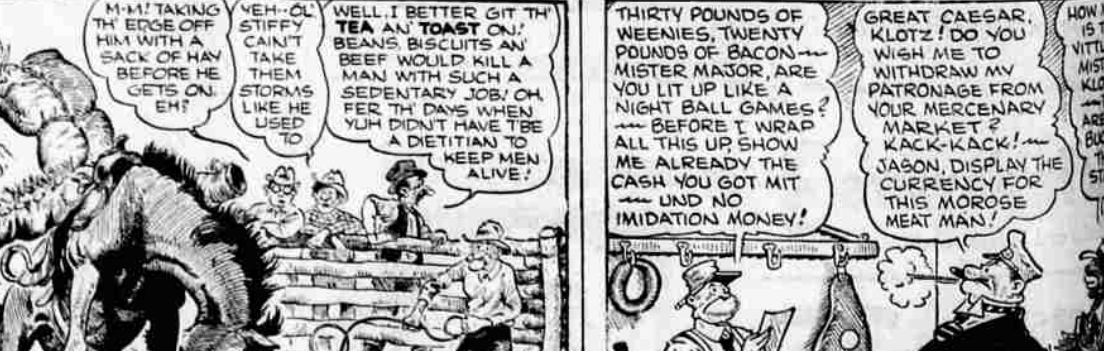
