

Giustina To Buck Springfield's "Indian Sign" Tonight; National League All-Stars Win, 7-1, From Junior Circuit

Reds Bolstered By New Flinger

The opposite ends of the Cascade league will come together with something very like a bang tonight when the first-half champions, the Giustina Reds, lock horns with the tailend Springfield Cardinals at 8:30 in the Civic stadium.

No mistake should be made as to the lively quality of the game, however, as, by one of those paradoxes that exist in baseball, the Cards have had the Indian sign on the Reds more than any other team in the league. Manager Ed Brauner is willing enough to talk about the fair-to-middling showing his boys have made against the scrappy Millers, now in first place, or against the heavy-hitting Hillbillies from Hills Creek, last year's champion, but his face grows gloomy when the conversation steers around to "Walt" Peerson, who makes a specialty of letting the Redmen down with two or three hits.

That doesn't mean that things are going to continue in this manner, though, indeed, far from it, if nine determined ballplayers and an equally determined manager have anything to say about it. The Reds are two full games behind the high-riding Miller Lumbermen, now in first place, and Brauner and his boys intend to overhaul them if their chase takes them over the carcasses of every ball club, collectively speaking, in the league—as it will probably have to do if the Giustinians are to overtake the well-balanced Miller aggregation.

In order to further the potency of the Reds, Brauner has signed Bob "Big Red" Caviness, who has been looking mighty good in training with the Birmingham Barons of the Southern Association. "Cav" could have stayed down South had he so chosen—the Barons didn't want to let him go—but he decided that he would rather play baseball than work out in the bullpen with two other available pitchers for every starting and good relief spot.

Umpiring tonight's fracas will be Dowdy at the plate and Charlie Christensen on the bases.

Jackson, Katonen To Tangle On Mat

The semifinal bout on Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling card looks like nearly as lively a struggle as the main event, with the Pacific coast lightweight champion Paavo Katonen signed to meet Bulldog Jackson, "clown prince" of grunts-and-graundum, in a 30-minute tussle.

Katonen, who is primarily an exponent of the clean, scientific style of wrestling, has grappled here before, generally against topflight opponents, and has maintained a high percentage of wins and losses, as well as a perfect record as far as title bouts are concerned. It is only fair to say that he was in several questionable decisions, but he has won plenty of clean-cut victories also, and in all his matches he has displayed a brand of wrestling seldom seen equalled in local parts.

Jackson is not supposed to be Katonen's equal in the art of simon-pure wrestling, but as anyone who has ever witnessed a bout in the local arena knows, more than straight grappling is generally required to render victory an assured thing. Jackson is a "meanie" through and through, and what he will undoubtedly try to do to Katonen may only be judged by those who have seen him whip many an opponent in the same ring into which he will step Saturday night.

He defeated Bill McEuin quite decisively last week, and claims that he will hammerlock the Finnish champion so hard that he'll have him talking Russian.

George Wagner and Elton Owen, who usually referees his brother Don's matches, will tangle in a main event "grudge match" which promises to be one of the most torrid goes of the season. Wagner swore that Owen robbed him of a decision last week in awarding a match to Herb Parks, and to prove his anger he knocked the referee over the ropes and out of the ring. Owen is no man to take something like that lying down, and he declared that he was more than willing to give "Gorgeous George" another chance to swing at him, only this time he had no intention of being knocked out of the ring, but proposed to do most of the knocking himself.

Milt Olsen or Ivan Jones will referee all matches. The place, for all who don't already know, is the Pearl Street Arena, and the time, in case any have forgotten, is 8:30 Saturday night.

Beavers Break Losing Streak

The San Francisco Seals clung to a perilous half-game lead in the Pacific Coast league madhouse pennant chase today, after dropping a 10-4 series opener to the Portland Beavers last night while Oakland was returning to a second place tie by whitewashing San Diego, 5-0.

Seattle, sharing second spot with the Acons, was idle while Hollywood was traveling to the northern city. Sacramento bopped Angels in fourth, one game behind Los Angeles 10-4 to leave the hind San Francisco and a half game ahead of San Diego.

The sixth-place Beavers jumped to within three games of the lead by pounding Seal left-hander Bill Werle and relief hurler Pard Ballou for 15 hits, breaking a 4-4 tie with a six-run smash in the seventh. Manager Marv Owen and Charlie Peterson each hit safely three times for the Beavers. Clarence Federmyer, relieving Marino Pieretti, got credit for the win.

Oakland jumped on San Diego's Chet Johnson for five runs in the first inning to sew up a 5-0 win in an otherwise tight pitching battle between Johnson and Henry (Cotton) Pippen. Pippen allowed but five scattered bingles while Johnson gave up six, four of them in the first. Singles by Emil Mailho, Jake Cauffman, Billy Raimondi and Pippen, combined with three walks, did the damage.

The last place Sacramento Solons, winners of their last six series, made a good start on the seventh by pounding out a 10-4—in over Los Angeles at the Angel park. The Solons battered four Angel twirlers for 13 hits, sinking Red Adams with five tallies in the fourth. Earl Porter got the win, which left Sacramento five games behind the Seals and but a half game behind idle Hollywood.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—(AP)—Among Pacific coast athletes who have left the playing fields and prize rings to see action in the Pacific theater are:

Night Games Now Allowed

PITTSBURGH, July 12.—(AP)—The National and American leagues today voted to permit all clubs to play their remaining games this year at night, except on Sunday, with the permission of visiting teams.

No indication was given of how many night games would be played as a result of this ruling, but the St. Louis Cardinals and Browns, the Philadelphia Bluejays and Athletics and the Chicago White Sox have indicated they would take advantage of the opportunity.

It also was voted to extend the Major-Minor league agreement until Jan. 12, 1946. Before this action becomes official, it must be approved by the National Association of Baseball, a minor league organization. As set up at present, the agreement would have expired Jan. 12, 1945.

The officials voted to have each league appoint a committee to report at their December meeting on the Major league pact under which Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis has ruled baseball since 1921.

The present pact expires Jan. 12, 1946.

Two Cubs Lead Nats To Victory

PITTSBURGH, July 12.—(AP)—The bottom half of the National league had proved too tough today for the top half of the American league and the senior circuit boasted its most impressive all-star game triumph in the 12-year history of baseball's mid-summer world series.

For it was Phil Cavarretta and Big Bill Nicholson, whose Chicago Cubs are buried deep in seventh place in the National league pennant race, who led an assault that blasted a three-year American league victory streak by a 17 to 1 score and gave the Nats their fourth triumph of the series.

The victim of their murderous hitting before a sweltering crowd of 29,589 at Forbes field last night was none other than Tex Hughson of the Boston Red Sox. Big Tex had won 14 against only three losses in the American league pennant chase this year, but that made little difference to the two Chicago clouters and their National league teammates.

Nats Bat Around

They hopped on the Texas tosser from the second place Bo-Sox in the fifth inning and before they batted around the lineup they had touched him for five hits and four runs that made all-star history. It was the biggest inning the Nats ever had in 12 games against the Americans, and it blew the ball game wide open.

Hank Borowy of the Yankees and Buckey Walters of the Cincinnati Reds opened on the mound and for a while it was a tight ball game. Borowy gave up three hits, allowed the Americans only one run.

That came in the second inning when Ken Keltner of Cleveland singled and advanced to third on two infield outs. Borowy then bounced a single through the middle to score Keltner with the lone American tally.

Hughson took over for the Americans in the fourth, and set down the Nats in short order. But then came the fifth, and disaster. Connie Ryan greeted him with a single and stole second as Marion fanned. Then came Nicholson with his heavy bat and Big Bill blasted out a screeching double that sent Ryan home with the tying run.

Augie Galan came through with a single to score Nicholson with what proved to be the clincher.

Cavarretta Hot

Cavarretta—who had a busy night with a triple, a single and three walks—got a pass to first. Stan Musial bounced to Bobby Doerr at second, but first baseman George McQuinn dropped the toss and the bases were full. Walker Cooper then singled to left, scoring Galan, and Cavarretta tried to make it home only to be trapped at the plate by Bob Johnson's toss to Hayes. Musial meanwhile moved to third and came home on Dixie Walker's single.

The National leaguers still were not satisfied and they pushed two more across in the seventh. Hal Newhouse of Detroit went in to pitch and they proceeded to belt him around. Again it was Cavarretta, with a single to center. Musial sacrificed him to second and Phil went to third when Cooper beat out an infield hit. Walker went out on a fly but Whitey Kurowski slammed a double that scored both Cavarretta and Cooper.

Hayes Errs

And in the eighth they really put it on ice with one more. Marion fanned but reached first when Frankie Hayes missed the ball. Ducky Medwick sacrificed him to second and Galan and Cavarretta—again—both walked to fill the bases. Musial lined to Johnson, Marion scoring after the catch, and that was the ball game.

The Americans used five hurlers, Borowy, Hughson, Bob Newsum, and they gave up 12 hits. The Nats used four, Walters, Ken Raffensberger, Rip Sewell and Jim Tobin, with Raffensberger getting credit for the win in his first all-star start. The foursome gave the Americans only six hits.

As losing manager Joe McCarthy summed it up: "They out-pitched us, out-hit us and made more runs. And they had two in-lads named Cavarretta and Nicholson."
