WFA to Requisition Turkeys for Fighters

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The war food administration has announced it will requisition turkeys to obtain supplies for Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's day dinners for the armed forces overseas.

Under an order effective July 17, the WFA will require that all turkeys marketed in major producing areas be set aside for government purchase. The order will continue in effect until the desired quantity is obtained.

Officials did not disclose the quantity sought, but indicated it exceeds the 35,000,000 pounds obtained under a similar order last year. The government already has obtained 8,000,000 pounds of hen turkeys under a set-aside order recently terminated. Total turkey production this year is expected to be about 480,000,000 pounds.

The bureau said the changes in the geographic distribution of the population were "marked" between those dates.

Chiefly as a result of internal migration, both civilian and military, the states of the south and west gained more than 4,000,000 inhabitants while the north-central and northeastern states lost about 2,000,000. The gain in the south and west was shared by all geographic divisions in the two regions.

Four states—Arizona, California, Florida and Nevada—and the District of Columbia increased by more than 20 per cent.

California had the greatest numerical increase, 1,559,135, and Arizona the greatest proportionate increase, 40.7 per cent.

The Pacific coast figures follow: Washington, 2,032,929 and 1,739,191, up 17.1; Oregon, 1,235,482 and 1,089,684, up 13.4; California, 8,466,522 and 6,907,367, up 22.6.

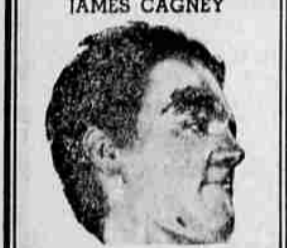

'Propaganda Work' By Pupils Critized

PORTLAND—(AP)—Mason Bingham, chairman of the Multnomah county tax supervising and conservation, has sharply criticized the Portland school administration for assigning students to do "propaganda work" in behalf of the special school tax levy which was passed at the May 19 election.

Although the issue had nothing to do with the budget, Bingham questioned Supt. of Schools Willard B. Spalding's judgment on the practice of having children in art classes make propaganda posters for a political measure.

Bingham said he didn't consider the drawing of the posters a proper activity for art students.

Spalding admitted the class activity was propaganda but pointed out that the students must use some kind of subject matter in their art work.

Agencies Told of Job Plans for Veterans

PORTLAND—(AP)—The U. S. civil service commission has announced that all federal agencies have been notified of changes in the commission's war service regulations, bringing them into accord with the recently-enacted Starnes-Scrugham act which gives new important advantages to veterans in qualifying for federal jobs.

The act provides for the granting of preference to certain classes of persons because of military service, and gives the president authority during the war and for five years thereafter, to designate positions for which competition shall be limited to veterans.
