The ODT man will be at the local board office each Tuesday from 1 to 9 p. m. Appointments should be made in advance, if possible, by calling the board, telephone 4697.

Norman Grimm, board chairman, believes that this ODT assistance will be of outstanding service to those who operate trucks or fleets. ODT recognizes, he said, that Eugene is one of the heaviest trucking points in the state, and wishes to do all possible to keep local transportation running smoothly. The service is not restricted to truckers in the local district of OPA.
