The first Church of Christ in Oregon was organized by Amos Harvey on March 18, 1846, somewhere "on the bank of the Yamhill river." The exact location may never be known, but it was near the present village of Whiteside and later was moved to Amity. This first church had 13 members. There are now 144 churches with 27,000 members.

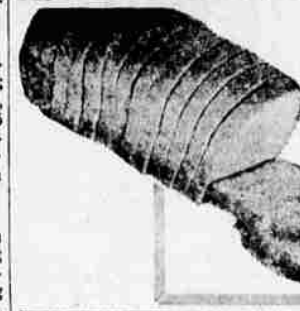
The pastor will leave on his vacation next week, this being his last Sunday in the pulpit until his return, August 3.

Meat Price Cut Will Affect Canned Types
WASHINGTON, July 15.—(U.P.)—The OPA has extended its previously announced 10 per cent reduction in meat ceilings to include the canned variety and said that consumers would receive the full benefit of this cut.

OPA explained that because retail prices are based on a percentage mark-up over cost-price, any reduction in the original cost of the meat ingredients would automatically bring a drop in the selling price to consumers.

The order is effective Aug. 4.

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WE NEED YOUR HELP WITH OUR WATER PROBLEM

BRIEFLY THE STORY IS THIS: In 1941 we had planned to install additional equipment to increase our raw water supply. After Pearl Harbor the government asked us to get by with what we had until the war is over. Now, still more city population, plus our obligations to supply water to Glenwood and other districts have increased our water demand by 12.3% over 1943. We can pump our complete McKenzie pipe line capacity (8 1/2 million gallons daily) to consumers for a short period . . . but we simply do not dare to let our reserves get low in the reservoirs. If we did there would be a critical danger in case of fire and other emergencies because we would not only be short of water but we would not have enough pressure.

Here's How You Can Help Save Water
Turn your sprinkler down so your lawn and not the sidewalk and street is watered.
Don't over water your lawn and garden. It harms them both and wastes lots of water.
Use a mulch, grass clippings or peat moss, on your lawn and garden. It will not only cut your watering in half but will also prevent the ground from baking hard.
Water in the evening. It is much better for both lawn and garden, and you will save lots of water through lack of evaporation.
Fix leaky faucets. The smallest drip can run into many gallons in just a short time.
Turn that faucet off . . . don't let the water run longer than necessary in sink and tub. Turn it off as soon as you have what you need.

If you will cooperate with us this summer we will be able to avoid making drastic restrictions.
