Circus To Hit Road As Fire Case Disputed

HARTFORD, Conn., July 15.—(UP)—A plan designed to permit the Ringling Brothers & Barnum and Bailey circus to resume its road tour, interrupted here by a maze of litigation following a disastrous fire in which 162 spectators were killed, was agreed on today and will be presented to the courts for approval.

The plan provides that the circus would furnish security of approximately \$1,000,000, an amount paralleling the total of damage suits filed by individuals as a result of the fire. The plan would dissolve a recently issued superior court order appointing a receiver for the circus and attaching its assets in Hartford which were valued at \$300,000.

Under the plan, the circus would put up a \$375,000 bond to cover its equity in the property now in Hartford, turn over its benefits from a \$125,000 fire insurance policy, sign over its \$500,000 public liability policy with Lloyds of London, and put up \$500,000 in cash for the expenses of the state receiver.

Upkeep of the circus assets here, including payment of salaries to about 1,000 of its idle employees, is costing \$10,000 a day, according to circus officials, who are anxious to get back on the road and put the big top on a paying basis.

More than 100 persons still were being treated at Hartford's four hospitals for burns and other injuries suffered in the fire. Eight cases were considered critical.

A coroner's inquest into the disaster and an investigation by the Connecticut state fire marshal is in progress. A board of inquiry, headed by Mayor William H. Mortensen will meet Monday to determine the city responsibility in the fire.

FDR And Churchill May Meet Soon

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—A meeting between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill may come about before long, the way cleared in part by Roosevelt's dramatic revision of French policy to permit practical cooperation with Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

The problem of Anglo-American relations with de Gaulle's national committee of liberation has been one of the most difficult ever to trouble the course of affairs which have to be handled jointly by Washington and London.

The president and the prime minister have at various times been fairly close together in their desire not to recognize the committee as a provisional government, but Churchill's position has been complicated first by the fact that his own foreign office has long favored recognition and second by indications that this attitude in recent months has become increasingly widespread throughout the British government.

Had this recognition issue remained in a highly unsettled condition with allied armies in France, it would undoubtedly have colored all the discussions of Roosevelt and Churchill in their expected talks.

California Farmers Hit New Profit High

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—(AP)—Cash income to California farmers reached an all-time high of \$1,520,119,000 in 1943 more than double the 1939 returns, and 31 per cent above 1942, figures released today by the state chamber of commerce disclosed.

The figures, based on estimates by the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics, showed California's cash income from crops last year was \$1,044,820,000, an increase of 37 per cent over the preceding year, and from livestock and livestock products, \$458,097,000, or 20 per cent above 1942.

Fruit crops produced \$522,652,000 a 45 per cent increase with citrus fruits, returning \$126,051,000, amounting to over 50 per cent of the national total. This was a 23 per cent increase over last year.

Cash returns from leading crops were: grapes, \$159,348,000; oranges, \$134,222,000; lemons, \$46,204,000; peaches, \$45,689,000; cotton, \$43,767,000; walnuts and almonds, \$38,581,000; potatoes, \$34,452,000; and prunes, \$31,039,000.

Market Reports

Public market stalls had difficulty this week in supplying demand for strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, blackberries and currants, particularly in cutting lots.

Key prices rose Saturday to overize 44 cents. Grade A large 40 cents, Grade A medium 35 cents, Grade A small 30 cents a box.

The first local string beans appeared in the stalls after Thursday, selling at two pounds for 15 cents. Parent beans arrived late in the week, selling at two pounds for 25 cents. A few peaches were available at 30 cents a box.

Sweet cherries were practically gone from the stalls, but the cherries at two pounds for 15 cents, are expected to be available another week.

Eugene market buying prices on eggs rose July 12 to Grade A large 37 cents, Grade B large 35 cents, Grade A medium 30 cents, Grade A small 25 cents, and Grade B medium 15 cents. Sweet cherries were scarce. Prices on loganberries and loganberries dropped to 37.75 per crate and 34 per crate respectively.

Eugene market wholesale egg prices also rose to Grade A large 44 cents, Grade A medium 39 cents, Grade A small 35 cents and Grade B large 30 cents.

Stocks quiet, a moderate advance today in spite of pre-week trading. General Motors and Wills-Owland had small losses while Chrysler held virtually unchanged from its previous level. American Telephone was about unchanged despite disclosure that June quarter net income failed to cover dividend requirements by 13 cents a share. June net was reported at \$2.13 a common share, against \$2.22 a year earlier.

Rails were higher as a group. Nickel and copper advanced. Metals and minerals advanced. Perse, Marquette, all made new highs on gains or around a point or more. Consolidated Lumber ran up fractionally to a new high when directors declared a 25-cent dividend, compared with 20 cents in the two previous quarters. This year preliminary closing Dow-Jones stock averages: Industrial 150.49, up 0.15; Rail 42.46, up 0.05; Utilities 24.21, up 0.06; 65 stocks 53.78, up 0.07. Sales totaled 42,640 shares compared with 455,300 last Saturday. Curb turnover amounted to 108,518 shares against 268,220 a week ago.

German Lack Of Manpower Confirmed

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—A captured German document confirmed that the enemy is suffering from a severe manpower shortage which is affecting the course of the war in Europe. Acting Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson disclosed Wednesday.

"There is no doubt that the enemy is faced with a manpower shortage," Patterson told a press conference.

"A German order, now several months old, decreed a 20 per cent reduction in strength of rear echelon combat units; a 25 per cent reduction of strength of all supply units; the immediate transfer without replacements of men of 1914 class and younger (men under 30) for rear echelons and supply units; and preparations for transfer, with replacements, of soldiers of 1906 to 1913 classes (men up to 38) from rear echelons and supply units."

"For manpower to keep the roads open behind their lines in Italy the Germans have ordered 'ruthless exploitation of civilian population for labor service.'"

The manpower shortage revealed by the document obtained in Italy was evident in Normandy where all troops available to them there, Patterson said.

Patterson said allied ground and air forces in Italy during the past week have continued to tighten the iron ring now constricting the Germans.

"In Russia, Normandy and Italy, the Nazi armies, fighting bitterly all the time, have been pushed back," he said. "Their reserves are being diminished."

"The allied attacks on three fronts give the Nazis very little leeway in which to practice a strategy of concentrating at one point and then shifting to another in an effort to throw back and relieve the allied pressure."

Patterson said these overall dif-

ficulties had not prevented effective German resistance in Normandy and that counterattacks were forcing the allies to fight bitterly for every foot of ground gained.
