Curtin Predicts Increased Forces

CANBERRA, Australia, July 18 — (P) — Prime Minister John Curtin told parliament here that though a transfer of main British efforts must await Germany's defeat, large and powerful forces would become available this year in the war against Japan.

He told the new session of parliament that when the full weight of British and American land and air forces was brought to bear the Japs would be decisively defeated as Hitler.

Curtin, recently a visitor to the United States and to London, asserted there was a minimum and a maximum fighting strength beyond which Australia could not go and that it was a balance between these limits which the government was seeking.

Australia, he said, will make a fighting contribution until the enemy is completely defeated but there are economic life ways in Australia's economic life which "we should commence to overtake."
