

Campus Newspaper In Closing Issue

Last issue of "The Summer Sun," an eight-page tabloid, edited by Miss Edith Newton, Portland, assisted by Will Lindley, also of Portland, came off the university press Tuesday morning. In all, six issues were issued in the first session, with Warren C. Price faculty editor for the Eugene session, and George Turnbull, editor for the Portland session.

In the final issue Price pays tribute to Miss Flora Furrow, sophomore in journalism from Eugene, as the "find" of the summer newspaper. He writes, "This young journalism major gathered and wrote interview articles on Dr. Maria Rickers-Osiankina of the psychology department and Dr. Lawrence S. Bee of sociology which could have been done on assignment and merited publication in the Portland Oregonian, or any metropolitan paper."

In addition, he praises the work of Miss Dorothy Lenhart, also of Eugene, a music major, who "did work only a shade less outstanding than that of Miss Furrow."

Highlights in this issue are a story about Mrs. Saide Orr Dunbar, Portland summer session teacher of community organization, who files once a month to Washington, D. C., where she serves as one of 12 members of the women's advisory committee of the war manpower commission, and an interview with Dr. E. C. A. Leach, professor of English, concerning his views on newspapers.

CAMP ADAIR—After thirty-one years of training recruits for the United States army, T-Sgt. OPA Tightens Gas Ration Procedure

WASHINGTON, July 18—(AP)—The office of price administration has plugged another loophole in gasoline rationing by tightening the procedure for turning in ration coupons when a car is sold to a dealer.

The seller may let the dealer handle the return of the coupons to the local ration board, but in "a number of cases," OPA said, dealers have failed to forward the full amount to the local board. Hereafter, both dealer and seller must sign a joint certification as to the amount and kind of ration currency surrendered. This document must be presented, with the coupons, to the board. The seller himself, as in the past, may surrender the unused ration and get a receipt from the local board which he turns over to the buyer.

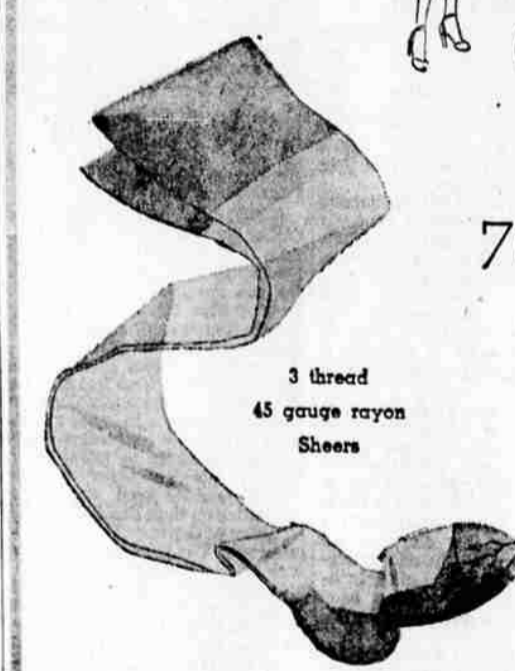
