

## Allied Leaders All 'Tired Men' Kerr Declares

CHICAGO, July 20.—Inspired by the rip-roaring keynote speech of a towering, somber-wearing oilman-governor, the fourth term democrats laid their 1944 campaign strategy squarely on the line today and it amounted to this:

If, as republican Thomas E. Dewey says, President Roosevelt and his new deal colleagues are "tired old men," so are Churchill, Stalin and Chiang Kai-shek. The 42-year-old Dewey raised the age issue when he became the republican nominee; the democrats threw it right back at him as they prepared to give Mr. Roosevelt his fourth consecutive nomination and offered to fight out the election on just that line.

**Challenge Republicans**  
Spokesman for this challenge was Oklahoma's Governor Robert S. Kerr who roused the democratic convention delegates to their highest pitch of the week last night by his 4,000-word keynote address. It was built around one theme—a change in administration while the nation is at war.

Six foot three and beaming beneath a snow white 10-gallon hat, Kerr depicted his party under Roosevelt as the party of achievement; the republicans as exemplified by Dewey as untested with no program except to "oppose."

The Oklahoman brought down the crowded house with references to "twelve long years when America 'hardened' under Harding, 'cooled' under Coolidge and 'hungered' under Hoover." "Hoover Backs Dewey" Dewey is Hoover's candidate, said Kerr.

The keynote did the unusual with his many references to Dewey. He hit most at the New Yorker's blast about the "tired old men" of the new deal. He said: "Shall we disregard 5-year-old Admiral Nimitz? Sixty-six year-old Admiral King? Sixty-four-year-old General George C. Marshall? Sixty-two-year-old Admiral Halsey?" "No, Mr. Dewey," Kerr exclaimed, "we know we are winning this war with these 'tired old men,' including the sixty-two-year-old Roosevelt as their commander-in-chief. What diplomatic or military

experience have you had that justifies you or us in believing that you can handle the most difficult and important responsibilities and duties ever placed upon the shoulders of any American?"

**Old Men Great**  
Churchill, Stalin and Chiang will be at the peace table, he said—their countries' "greatest and wisest" men.

"Who will represent the United States? he asked, "an untired leader who has not even told his own people what his views are? Or the man who has from the start declared his position in clear and certain words and who has the respect and esteem of all the united nations?"

### More Workers Asked On Surgical Dressings

### Farmers Get Bonus For Plowing Vetch

CORVALLIS, July 20.—(P)—Growers of vetch and pea seed crops can earn an AAA practice payment of 60 cents an acre for leaving all straw on the ground when combining, or by returning it to the soil if a stationary outfit is used, the state AAA office said today.

This practice was authorized for the first time last year but the action came so late many Oregon farmers were not notified. The fertilizer value of legume straw is high, and the additional organic matter improves soil structure, making full use of such straw one of the best conservation practices, according to Oregon State college soil specialists.

## Lucky Boy Scouts On Mountain Climb

Twenty nine Boy Scouts from Camp Lucky Boy, under the leadership of Ray Sims, veteran Obsidian mountain climber, climbed to the top of the Middle Sister (Elev. 10,038 ft.) on Tuesday, July 18.

The hike of four and a half miles from Frog camp to Camp Sunshine, at the base of the mountains, was in charge of Judson Compton, scout executive, who accompanied the boys on the climb.

The climb from Camp Sunshine to the summit was made in six hours, and as the day was perfect for climbing, more than an hour was spent at the top, as it was the first climb for most of the boys. Identification of all the snow-capped mountains, Mt. Hood, Mt. Jefferson, Three Fingers Jack, Mt. Washington, the North and South Sisters, Broken Top, The Husband, The Bachelor and Diamond peak was made from the top.

The descent of the mountain required only an hour and a half, as the scouts skated and slid down snow fields and glaciers all the way to the base camp.

Glen Simmons, scout master of troop 51 assisted Sims on the climb.

The climbers had just returned to their base camp Tuesday evening as the thunder and lightning storm broke over the mountains, but as there was plenty of shelter for their sleeping bags, the three-hour downpour did not dampen their spirits. The hike out to Frog camp was made Wednesday morning and all returned by car to Camp Lucky Boy.

## War Prisoners Given Supplies from War Fund

American prisoners of war in eight Japanese camps have now received materials for relieving the monotony of their restricted routine, according to word reaching the Oregon war chest headquarters at Salem from the national war fund.

The materials were obtained, in part, through last winter's contributions to the Lane community war chest, made by people of this county. The report stated that 33 cases of materials, shipped by war relief services, CWCW, a participating service of the national war fund, had been received and distributed at prisoner-of-war camps under Japanese domination located at Osaka, Tokyo, Hakodate, Zentsuji, Fukuoka, Korea, and Kiangwan.
