Trans-Border Air Service Increased

To handle increased mail-passenger-cargo traffic between busy Pacific coast cities and Vancouver, United Air Lines today inaugurated a second daily Seattle-Vancouver round trip, according to announcement by C. A. Eberhardt, station manager for the company here.

The flight leaves Seattle at 9 p. m., arriving at Vancouver less than an hour later and returning to Seattle before midnight.

SIX-POINT PROGRAM OF CLUBS INTERESTS

Attracting interest of many in club programs is the six-point presentation, advancing international co-operation as the best possible means of obtaining permanent peace, approved by the recent convention of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs in New York city.

Points as outlined in the convention platform as received by the Eugene Business and Professional Women's club include:

1. To rid the world of aggressive war is the paramount challenge of our generation.

2. Force should be the servant of the law. Responsibility rests on the United States to do its share in aiding the organization of the world.

3. A permanent court of international justice should receive the support of the government of the United States.

4. Freedom of thought and expression must be considered on an international basis.

5. The world is an economic unit. Effort should be made to raise the standard of living of people everywhere in order that the goal "freedom from want" shall be achieved.

6. We cannot substitute declarations of principles for deeds. Only by action can we achieve the kind of world we want.

Little Vacation Transportation Seen

PORTLAND — (AP) — Families and vacationers away from home may be stranded because of transportation needs of the armed services, according to word received in an official communication from Washington by Frank H. Hocken, district ODT rail director.

Hocken was informed that "the transportation needs of the armed services, and the requirements to care for the wounded, will be met regardless."

ODT also reported that "organized troop movements already absorb more than half of all Pullman cars, and more than a third of all day coaches. Travel of service men and women on furlough, and individually on orders, take up another third of the day coach space."

With an increase of 250 per cent in passenger traffic, there still has been virtually no additional equipment made available for passenger movement.

U. O. Enrollment Gains Indicated

Increase of almost 50 per cent in fall term enrollment for new students at the University of Oregon is indicated by the number of advance applications as compared to last year. Out of a total of 345 new students admitted, 299 are women, a 65 per cent increase over 181 the same date last year. Admission of 46 men as compared to 50 a year ago shows a 9 per cent decrease.

Clifford Constance, assistant registrar, in releasing the figures, said that the downward trend of university registration had undoubtedly ceased with spring term since enrollment of 471 for first

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session showed a 22 per cent increase over last year. More women students are attending school and several honorably discharged service men are continuing their studies.

Incoming students are divided into 301 entering freshmen, 39 advanced undergraduate transfers, 4 graduate students, and 1 special

student. Listed are 261 from Oregon schools, and 84 from out-of-state.
