Low Quality Beef Off Ration List

WASHINGTON, July—War Food Administrator Marvin Jones has directed the office of price administration to remove all lower quality beef steaks and beef roasts from the ration list but to end the point holiday on hams and pork loins, it was learned here.

The change would go into effect Aug. 1, and would make ration free all beef except good and choice grades of steaks and roasts. Pork is not rationed at present, but some lower quality beef requires points.

Informed quarters said publication of Jones' directive had been withheld for 10 days to give OPA time to carry out its provisions in setting exact ration values.

It was understood that Jones made the request in order to clear crowded storage space in preparation for the flood of beef which is expected to arrive on the market this fall.

The order marks the first time that Jones has formally invoked his authority to direct rationing. In the past, WFA has reported the available supply of foods and left it to OPA to determine what specific rationing will be needed for equitable distribution.

Maverick Urges High Postwar Production

SEATTLE, July—(U.P.)—Termining the Pacific coast's all-out mechanization for the war effort "spectacular," Maury Maverick, chairman of the smaller war plants corporation, urged business and labor to retain new highs created during wartime and strike for greater goals in the post-war period.

Maverick's "post-war plan for the west," a report compiled after consultations with civic and public groups and individuals on the coast, brought out the vital part the northwest will play in making "freedom from want" a reality following the war.

In an address prepared for delivery before the Seattle chamber of commerce, Maverick said plans are already underway on the coast to bridge the gap between termination of war contracts and peace-time industries in order to assure employment to war veterans and workers.

"Among the federal projects planned for the Pacific northwest, the Columbia basin project constitutes one of the most extensive," he said.

"It has been estimated that approximately 10,000 workers will be given employment, building reservoirs, pump plants, ditches, etc. There also is a program amounting to approximately \$600,000,000 for the development of the Columbia river watershed, which will affect Washington, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Wyoming.

Goals to be met in the reconstruction program outlined by Maverick are:

1. Conservation of natural resources in order to make possible greater production.

2. Development of new industries in order to take advantage of low cost, abundant power.

3. Creation of greater demand for use of the northwest as a national playground.

4. Retention and utilization of as much of the new industry capacity as possible.

U.S. Sought Pacific Isles at Peace Parley

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The United States tried after World War I to return the Caroline, Marshall, Marianas and Samoa islands to Germany so that it then could bargain with Germany for their outright acquisition.

The proposal, made to the peace conference by the American representatives, came to nought and the former German islands, already held by Japan in 1918 and well on the road to Japanization, were eventually mandated to Japan.

The proposal was brought to light recently as American officials agreed that those Pacific islands must be kept by the United States after this war. But a lot of those officials are concerned and searching for a way to reconcile such acquisition with the pledges of the Atlantic charter and the Cairo declaration against territorial expansion.

The proposal for returning the islands to Germany after World War I was published recently in the state department's volume of papers relating to the Paris peace conference, but it was overlooked there because of the vast amount of other material released.

Assistant Secretary of State Breckenridge Long, who was also assistant secretary of state during Woodrow Wilson's administration, was author of the plan. He sent it to the secretary of the commission to negotiate peace in Paris on Dec. 14, 1918, with instructions to convey it with its "very confidential thoughts" to Col. Edward House, President Wilson's advisor.

The Long memorandum pointed out that Japan already had closed the islands to foreign trade and limited ports of call for foreign cargo vessels to two.
