

44 4-H Clubs Get 100 Per Cent Rating

Italy Casualties Listed

WASHINGTON—(AP)—American army casualties in Italy from the time of the landings last September to July 12 totaled 137,166, acting Secretary of War Patterson reported here. This was an increase of 2,767 for one week.

The death list now stands at 12,999, an increase of 344 for the week; the wounded at 49,561, an increase of 2,104. There are 10,606 missing.

Figures for other theaters were not announced today.

Wastage Charged On Alaska Highway

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., July 22.—(CP)—Mrs. Dorothy Steeves, C. C. F. member of the legislature for north Vancouver, charged in an address here last night that "horrible wastage" including destruction of foodstuffs is occurring along the Alaska highway.

"Horrible wastage occurs along the Alaska highway," she said, "through seeming laxity of the Canadian government with huge piles of foodstuffs, including sugar, burning away."

Mrs. Steeves said hundreds of trucks, oil-heaters and cook-stoves had been abandoned, and that while she and her party were fixing three flat tires near Carcross, Y. T., the smell of burning rubber attracted her to a "huge pile of tires burning."

Mrs. Steeves said at Watson lake airport she was "refused accommodation in the Canadian Pacific airways place or use of the community hall, and I had to depend upon the hospitality of the Americans."

White, Negro Outbreak Quelled in England

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A disorder between white and Negro American troops, in which a number were injured, occurred in Bristol, England, July 15, Acting Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson revealed today at his press conference.

He said a preliminary report disclosed some troops were under arrest, both Negro and white. White paratroopers and Negro soldiers helped quell the outbreak.

Black Market Found In Japanese Flags

CHUNGKING—(AP)—Burma correspondent of the Central Daily News reported here that Japanese flags captured from the enemy by Chinese were selling briskly to American soldiers for 30 packages of American cigarettes apiece.

"This is the black market price," the correspondent said, "because each Jap flag is worth 50 packages of American cigarettes."

High Temperatures Mean Quick Ripening for Crops Throughout State

PORTLAND—(AP)—Temperatures climbing up into the nineties ripened crops rapidly during the past week, the weather bureau reported here.

The weekly crop-weather survey showed no rain in most of the state, with only a few scattered showers too light to be of benefit.

Harvesting of winter grain is becoming general in the earlier areas, the bureau said. Yields were described as "satisfactory," although some grain contained too much moisture to be accepted at terminals. Corn, although lacking moisture in non-irrigated areas, improved under the warmer temperatures. Spring grain needs rain in most sections.

Haying continued during the week under favorable conditions, with large stocks already baled. The second cutting of alfalfa and Ladino clover began in earlier areas; and rye grass, clover, and fescue seed was being threshed. Livestock were in good condition despite rapidly-drying pastures.

A few apricots, early cherries and early apples have been picked. The bureau predicted a good prospect for nuts, and said late fruits were progressing well.

Malheur county's main crop ripening rapidly in Umatilla county. The bureau also reported ripening fiber flax, active celery shipping, and thriving sugar beets.

White, Negro Outbreak Quelled in England

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A disorder between white and Negro American troops, in which a number were injured, occurred in Bristol, England, July 15, Acting Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson revealed today at his press conference.

He said a preliminary report disclosed some troops were under arrest, both Negro and white. White paratroopers and Negro soldiers helped quell the outbreak.

Demos Credit AAA With Saving Farmers

CHICAGO—The democratic party gave the new deal's AAA crop control program credit for saving agriculture from the last depression here, but expressed willingness to toss that program overboard for a better one after the war if necessary.

In a platform appeal for farmer support at coming elections, the democrats promised to enact such additional farm legislation as time and experience may require, and to amend or repeal any existing law which has failed to accomplish its purpose.

The AAA has been a controversial issue for several years. The republican convention went far, however, in removing it from the campaign by writing into its platform an endorsement of crop adjustment as an emergency or last-resort method of handling surpluses.

The democrats held to the original goal of the AAA—a promise to place and keep agriculture on an "income parity" with industry and labor. Under their new platform, they would do this by means of price guarantees and other undefined "practical steps."

Republicans pledged farmers an "American market price" and an income "fair and equitable" in comparison with other economic groups. They condemned subsidies as a substitute for fair prices. Democrats made no mention of subsidies, of which the Roosevelt administration has made wide use.
