Youth Platoons Need More Boys and Girls

More than 100 additional work-
ers are needed to complete the
bean-picking platoons in Eugene
and about 15 in Springfield, Miss
Lovina Wilson, farm labor assist-
ant, said Monday.

Sixteen platoons of school stu-
dents to work in the bean fields
were organized last week. 14 of
them being in Eugene and two in
Springfield. Each platoon is to
be made up of about 40 workers
and their own adult supervisor
who will also act as their field
boss. Members of the platoons
are students who have finished
the fifth grade and not yet com-
pleted high school.

It is necessary that more stu-
dents sign up in order to harvest
the crops this fall without loss.
Miss Wilson points out. To sign
up on either the Springfield or
Eugene crews they are advised to
go to the farm labor office, 979
Olive street or telephone Eugene
1831.

Bean picking will not really
start until the first week in Aug-
ust. As soon as a field to which
a platoon has been assigned is
ready to pick, that platoon will be
called to go to work. Each in-
dividual picker will receive noti-
fication from his platoon leader.

Young Vandals Cut Seats On City Bus

Teen-age vandals with jack-
knives during the week-end de-
stroyed the leather upholstery of
several seats on a River Road-
College Crest bus, while riding as
passengers, James Storer, man-
ager of the Oregon Motor Stages

instruments the culprits sliced
huge gashes in the upholstery and
in some instances ripped the
springs out of the seats. Accord-

Man, Boy Drown In Reedsport Area

REEDSPORT—Two drowning
tragedies occurred in this area
late Friday. Richard Leonard
Stephenson, 8, was drowned early
in the evening when he fell from
a log into Mill creek.

Alex McCloud, 56, was drowned
in the Umpqua river about 9 p.m.
Friday, and his body had not been
recovered up to Monday noon.

The Stephenson boy, son of Mr.
and Mrs. Edward C. Stephenson
of the Mill Creek district, and his
younger brother, Bill, were play-
ing on logs stored in the creek by
the Camp Creek Timber company,
for whom the father works as
timber faller, and in some way
both boys fell into the water. Bill
was able to reach shore safely
and ran for his parents, both of
whom had had first-aid training,
the mother being a registered
nurse from the state of Washing-
ton.

Resuscitation efforts were car-
ried on by the parents until the
arrival of M. M. Kelly, chief of
the Reedsport fire department,
and H. M. McCabe, deputy sheriff,
with the Reedsport oxygen in-
halator which was used unsuc-
cessfully for more than an hour.

Richard Stephenson was born
at Olympia, Wash., Nov. 14, 1935,
and had lived in Washington un-
til three years ago when his fam-
ily moved to the Loon Lake dis-
trict from Centralia. Besides his
parents he is survived by two
brothers, Bill, aged 7, and Pat,
aged 5, and a sister, Marylyn,
aged 17 months; also his grand-
parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Steph-
enson, of Oak Harbor, Wash., and
Mr. and Mrs. Yunkers, of Olympia.

Funeral services will be held
Tuesday at the Unger mortuary
in Reedsport, with interment in
Reedsport cemetery.

McCloud was a piledriver and
dredge operator, and at the time
of his death was employed as a
dredge operator at the Hubbard
island in the Umpqua river. He
is survived by two sisters and
several brothers, all of whom re-
side in the Coos Bay area. Two
of his brothers are Jack and Bill
McCloud, of the Coos Bay Dredg-
ing company, Marshfield.

Auto Registration In Oregon Up One Per Cent

Motor vehicle registration in
Oregon totaled 400,482 vehicles at
the end of June this year, com-
pared to 395,007 for the same
period of 1943, Secretary of State
Bob Farrell announced Monday.
This represents an increase of
slightly over one per cent.

Passenger vehicles numbered
320,863, compared to 319,008 a
year ago; busses totaled 1,160
against 1,066 a year ago while
trucks numbered 41,966, compared
to 39,650.

Registration fees for the six
month period amounted to \$3-
142,011.65, compared to fees total-
ing \$2,969,835.04 a year ago.
