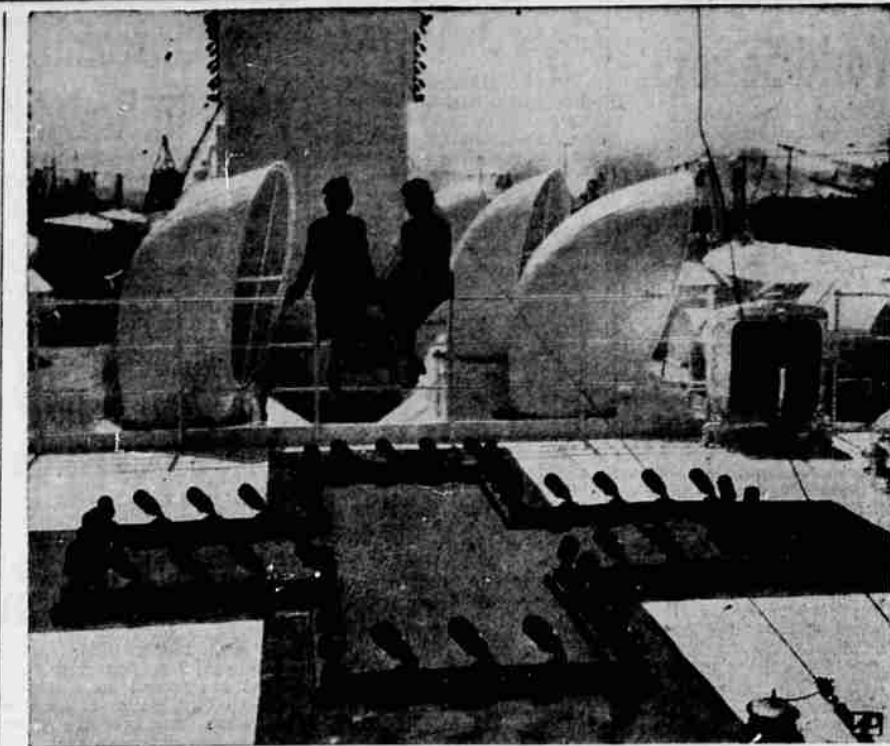

Commentator Urges Death Probe By Thomas Dewey

NEW YORK. — (AP) — Upton Close, news commentator and author, urged in a recent nationwide broadcast that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey investigate the death of

John Bryan Owen, grandson of William Jennings Bryan, the national broadcasting company said here.

NBC said that Close, broadcasting on the world news parade program, Sunday, July 8, urged that Dewey inquire into the death of Owen, who died on Jan. 2, 1943, in a Greenwich Village studio at the age of 38, to "ascertain as true or repudiate as false" reports that Owen, son of Mrs. Ruth Bryan Rohde, former United States minister to Denmark, died after he allegedly learned of the existence of secret cables dealing with America's diplomatic role before the war.

NBC quoted Close as saying in that broadcast:

"Is it true that the Russian secret police obtained copies of cables exchanged between Churchill and Roosevelt? Did the mysterious death of the grandson of William Jennings Bryan just after his return from England have a connection with all this?"

"Will the former fighting district attorney of New York pick up the thread of that death in Greenwich village and try to untangle the snarl of this international scheme?"

Owen, actor, artist and freelance writer, was found dead in his small studio several weeks after his return from Britain. Although police first suspected foul play and listed the death as suspicious, an autopsy revealed that Owen had died naturally, and injuries on his body were old ones.

Miss Florence Paine, a neighbor, heard a thud in Owen's apartment, and investigating found him unconscious near his desk. On his desk was an unfinished letter to a relative, whose name was withheld by police, explaining that he had suffered mild injuries several weeks earlier when a taxicab grazed him in a dim-out.

The New York city medical examiner, after an autopsy, announced that death was due to natural causes.

America Firsters May Choose Own Candidate

CHICAGO, July 25. — (AP) — Gerald L. K. Smith, national director of the America First party, believes that 98 per cent of the workers in that organization favor the formation of a new nationalist party with its own presidential candidate.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's attitude towards the America Firsters "has cost Dr. Dewey the presidency," Smith declared here yesterday. However, he added that his followers will not support the democratic ticket.

"Among the people who have been mentioned by our leaders as favorites for president are Charles A. Lindbergh, Burton K. Wheeler and Robert R. Reynolds," he said.

"We had hoped to be able to go along with the republican party this year but Gov. Dewey insists on condemning our America First movement," Smith said.

"In his April 4 speech he even referred to our people as 'rodents.' This has completely alienated the America First element and has stimulated their desire to form a new nationalist party."

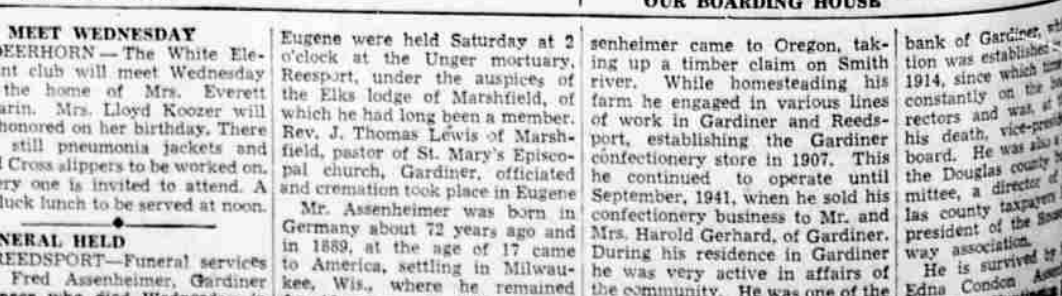

FUNERAL HELD REEDSPORT — Funeral services for Fred Assenheimer, Gardiner pioneer who died Wednesday in

Eugene were held Saturday at 2 o'clock at the Unger mortuary, Reedport, under the auspices of the Elks lodge of Marshfield, of which he had long been a member. Rev. J. Thomas Lewis of Marshfield, pastor of St. Mary's Episcopal church, Gardiner, officiated and cremation took place in Eugene.

Mr. Assenheimer was born in Germany about 72 years ago and in 1889, at the age of 17 came to America, settling in Milwaukee, Wis., where he remained for 13 years. In 1902 Mr. As-

senheimer came to Oregon, taking up a timber claim on Smith river. While homesteading his farm he engaged in various lines of work in Gardiner and Reedport, establishing the Gardiner confectionery store in 1907. This he continued to operate until September, 1941, when he sold his confectionery business to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Gerhard, of Gardiner. During his residence in Gardiner he was very active in affairs of the community. He was one of the organizers of the First National

bank of Gardiner, which was established in 1914, since which time he constantly on the board of directors and was also a member of the Douglas county board. He was also a member of the county taxpay-ers association. He is survived by his wife, Edna Condon Assenheimer, teacher of Huntington
